Resolved, That as a mark of respect to her memory and appreciation of her past services and labors in behalf of this lodge and the cause of temperance, our charter be draped in mourning the usual length of time, and a copy of these resolutions be furnished under seal of the lodge to the husband and brother of the deceased.
