After many years he obtained release and was on his way to the nome of his boyhood, when he fell in with his old employer, who informed him that his wife, believing him dead, had remarded, and, stunned by his trouble, he surrendered all cinim as husband and father to the man who had stepped into his place, and departed. Mrs. Duniway has found a theme in this story with which her heart heats in warmest sympathy, and her lines flow on in the smooth cadence in-dicative of the fullest accord. She pictures the gentle, tender, trustful Anna and the wily, cov

cious Pelatiah in vivid colors; and how years of poverty and longing, and the cries of the hun-gry boys, compelled poor Anna to yield to Pelatiah's Importanity,

" And look henceforth for love to me." A little further on he says:

" Become my wife and you shall be Made happy through prosperity,

While, if she persists in declining his advances, wolf-like, he threatens to abandon her to star-vation and cold. And this Pelatiah was a "deucon," "In exportations deep and land,"

The wanderings of David, his captivity, release, hapless interview with Pelatian, discovery of Anna's second wilehood, and his sad going back to Algeria, are all told so pathetically that our teclings are deeply enlisted. No one, with any true sentiment, can read the poem without being thoroughly stirred. The flustrations are in admirable keeping with the passages they are designed to portray, and a fine engraving of the author is a fifting frontispiece. The subject spirit, fire and passion of the poem should give it an extensive reading, aside from the Interest which the literary reputation of the author must awaken in it. As a specimen of book-making

the volume is certainly beautiful, and would adorn any center-table.
