The time of leaving Portland for the excursion to Puget Sound is fixed for Tuesday, the 24th inst., while the tickets will be good for return any time before July 15th.

The State of California arrived at San Francisco on her last trip in 37 hours and 25 minutes after leaving the Columbia bar. This beats the Oregon's best time an hour and ten minutes.

Portland Bethel Hall, corner of North Third and E streets, was dedicated on last Sunday. Chaplain and Mrs. Stubbs have labored most faithfully to secure the erection of the Hall, and their efforts have been crowned with success.

Two Chinamen who arrived on the last trip from China have since died. The Standard says they were kept in the prison hospital to the rear of the Jones-house, where they must have been starved to death, as they were nothing but skin, bone and flesh.

Lawrence Barrett, supported by a carefully selected company from San Francisco, opens at New Market Theater to-night in Bulwer's great play of "Editha." The season will last but a few nights, and the program will be a change of programme at each performance.

Governor Thayer has donated a silver trumpet, valued at \$150, to the Fire Department of East Portland, to be offered as a prize for the fastest time made by a fireman in a 150-yard race at East Portland Park on the fourth of July. "The contest will be open to every company in the State" except No. 2's of this city. Mr. R. H. Thompson, of that company, being barred.

Mr. A. B. Mecheney, of Pennsylvania, and Rev. E. S. Mecheney, of Michigan, father and brother of Mrs. H. W. Scott and Mrs. T. M. McClintock of this city, arrived here last week, and will make an extended visit. It is the first time they have seen Oregon, and they are delighted with it. Before their return, they will visit many parts of the State, and perhaps of Washington Territory.

Last Monday the election for municipal officers was held, resulting in the choice of five Democrats and three Republicans. Hon. D. F. Thompson, Rep., for Mayor, received 46 majority; E. Corbett, Dem., for Police Commissioner, 91; Jos. Bachman, Dem., for City Treasurer, 84; Wm. J. Kelly, Dem., for City Assessor, 59. Committee—Richard Gerzins, Dem., First Ward, 129; T. J. Nicklitz, Rep., Second Ward, 187; J. S. Keller, Dem., Third Ward (long term), 15; J. F. Watson, Rep., (short term), 112.

The city election of East Portland, last Monday, resulted in the choice of the entire Republican ticket, except the Trustees from the Second Ward. I. A. Saunders, Recorder, received 35 majority; Ross Merrick, Marshal, 62; W. F. Coupl, Treasurer, 109; J. Gerdeman, Street Commissioner, 102; Wilbur Kern, Assessor, 1. McCuen, the Democratic candidate, will contest Kern's election. Trustees—Cyrus Buckman, First Ward, 13; W. H. Moore, Second Ward, 35; W. C. Wilson, Third Ward, 30.

The "bridge across the Willamette" may yet be realized. The whole amount of the capital stock of the Portland Bridge Company, which was incorporated February 7, 1878, has been subscribed. A meeting of the stockholders and incorporators will be held in this city on the 23d of July at the office of M. C. George. The object of the meeting is to elect not less than three Directors, as the stockholders present shall determine. A full attendance of both incorporators and stockholders is requested.

REGENT EVENTS.

The Denver and Rio Grande Railroad has been placed in the hands of a receiver.

The anniversary of the battle of Bonker Hill was celebrated on the 17th inst.

Henry W. Blair was elected to the Senate from New Hampshire on Tuesday last.

Returns have been about for several days that the Pacific Mail Company is in danger of being closed out.

The Iowa Republican re-nominated Governor Gear and Lieutenant Governor Campbell by acclamation.

New York City is reported threatened with yellow fever, two vessels with the disease on board being in the upper bay.

The largest "involvement" of Chinamen in two years, 1129, arrived in San Francisco by the City of Tokio on the 15th inst.

The losses by the Point Breeze fire, near Philadelphia, on Wednesday and Thursday, amounted to about half a million.

North Adams, Mass., has been visited by a disastrous flood, and the damage throughout the district amounts to hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The House Labor Committee has decided to visit San Francisco and other leading western cities, after adjournment, to take further testimony.

Returns to the Department of Agriculture show that the average condition of winter wheat for June is 90 against 98 last year. The acreage of spring wheat sown is about four per cent. increase over last spring.

At Buffalo Gap, Dakota, on Thursday night, by the sudden rise and overflow of Beaver Creek, caused by a water spout, eleven persons were drowned. Five minutes from the first alarm, the whole country was flooded, and the water subsided almost as suddenly as it rose.

The number of acres within the forty-mile grant limits of the appended and shorter route of the Northern Pacific Railroad through Washington Territory to Puget Sound will be four millions less than on the old circular route, which will be restored to the public domain.

The court-martial in the case of Colonel D. L. Stanley and Colonel W. B. Hazen has found the former guilty of conduct to the prejudice of good order and military discipline, and sentenced him to be admonished in general orders by the General of the Army. General Sherman approved the proceedings and findings and says: "The officers will resume their respective duties," and adds, "Both parties will be careful that the service be not injured by a revival of the subject."

The most remarkable meeting yet held in honor of William Lloyd Garrison was in Atlanta, Georgia, on the 9th inst. Bishop Haven presided. The resolutions adopted contained the following: "From this State and capital, where \$5,000 was offered for the head of the great philanthropist, we rejoice to make this declaration to all the land, and call upon all to praise and serve the God who led our Moses to conquer the Pharaoh of American slavery, and to make his captives free."

The wealthiest single woman in the world is Miss C. L. Wolfe, of New York. She is worth over \$10,000,000, and has just returned from a two-years' trip to Europe.
