We have also, much of a local character to be passed upon during the little time allotted us for deliberation. Col. Hubbs then referred to various matters of interest, and concluded by again presenting thanks.

On motion of Mr. Denny, The members and officers elect had the oath of office administered by Hon. Frank Clark of Pierce county.

On motion of Mr. Clark, The House was informed that the Council was organized and ready to proceed to business.

On motion of Mr. Caples, The hour for convening was fixed at 10 o'clock, in the morning, until otherwise ordered. Adjourned.

WEDNESDAY, Dec. 5, 1860. Mr. Caples introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the standing committee heretofore known as the "Committee on Memorials" be hereafter designated as the committee on "Federal Relations." Adopted.

The President announced the standing committees as follows: Education—Messrs. Woodard, Caples and Miller.

Ways and Means—Messrs. Biles, Burbank and Clark.

Judiciary—Messrs. Clark, Miller and Burbank.

Chains—Messrs. Burbank, Denny and Woodard.

Roads and Highways—Messrs. Woodard, Denny and Simms.

Military Affairs—Messrs. Caples, Biles and Woodard.

Engrossed Bills—Messrs. Caples, Burbank and Clark.

Enrolled Bills—Messrs. Biles, Woodard and Denny.

Indian Affairs—Messrs. Miller, Burbank and Simms.

Commerce—Messrs. Simms, Caples and Miller.

Printing—Messrs. Miller, Denny and Woodard.

Corporations—Messrs. Clark, Biles and Denny.

Federal Relations—Messrs. Miller, Caples and Simms.

Mr. Caples introduced a bill to dissolve the bonds of matrimony existing between Onon Connolly and Sarah Connolly, and to restore the said Sarah to her maiden name.

Read twice and referred to committee on Judiciary.

Mr. Burbank introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That a committee of two be appointed on the part of the Council to act with a similar committee on the part of the House, to wait upon His Excellency, the Governor, and inform him that the Legislature is now organized and ready to receive any communication he may be pleased to make.

The resolution was adopted, and Messrs. Burbank and Clark were appointed said committee.

Mr. Caples introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Sergeant-at-Arms be instructed to procure six copies, in wrappers, of the Pioneer and Democrat, or Washington Standard, or any other paper published in this Territory, or any number of each or either, as may be elected by the person entitled thereto, for the use of each member and officer of the Council. Adopted.

Mr. Burbank, from joint committee appointed to wait upon the Governor, reported that His Excellency was in readiness to meet the Legislative Assembly in joint convention in the Representatives' Hall, and deliver his annual message in person.

On motion of Mr. Burbank, Resolutions were adopted requesting the Secretary of the Territory to procure a clock for the use of the Council. Also, to procure from the Surveyor General a late map of the plats and surveys of this Territory for the use of Council.

On motion, the Council proceeded to the hall of the House of Representatives to receive the message of His Excellency, the Governor.

After the delivery of the message, the Council returned to their chamber. Mr. Caples moved 1,000 copies of the message and accompanying documents be printed for the use of the Council.

Mr. Miller moved to amend by inserting fifteen hundred.

The amendment prevailed, and the motion, as amended, was adopted. Adjourned.

MONDAY, Dec. 3, 1860. The members elect to the House of Representatives met in their hall and proceeded to a temporary organization by appointing Lyman Shaffer chairman, and J. E. Woodson chief clerk.

Messrs. Ferguson, Phillips, Foster, Briscoe and Chapman were appointed a committee on Credentials, when the House adjourned until ten o'clock, tomorrow morning.

Island—Thos. Coupe. In the case of Mr. Henness of Thurston county, the committee reported the seat as contested by T. F. Berry, and the seat of H. M. Stearnes of Lewis county, contested by T. R. Winston.

Mr. Ferguson submitted a minority report, in which he concurred with the majority of said committee, but further recommended that the gentlemen be excluded from taking any part in the proceedings of the House until the question of contest shall be decided.

The majority report was adopted, and Messrs. Henness and Stearnes, the gentlemen holding certificates, were permitted to take their seats.

The members elect were now sworn in, and the House proceeded to the election of Speaker by ballot.

Messrs. Anderson, Briscoe, Van Vleet, Hyatt, Ferguson and Shaffer were put in nomination for Speaker.

Messrs. Warbass and Cannady were appointed tellers.

After several ineffectual ballottings, Mr. Shaffer was chosen on the 9th ballot.

The House then proceeded to the election of Chief Clerk by *visa voce*. Chas. Egan was elected Chief Clerk on the third ballot, and J. W. Johnson was elected Assistant Clerk by acclamation.

E. W. Perry was elected Sergeant-at-Arms, and Wm. Watson, of Spokane county Door Keeper.

Adjourned.

WEDNESDAY, Dec. 5, 1860. The officers of the House were sworn in by Frank Clark, Esq., notary public.

On motion of Mr. Phillips, The contested seats from Thurston and Lewis counties were referred to a special committee.

Messrs. Bozarth, Harris, Pengree, Hastings and Suttle were appointed said committee.

The Council and House now met in joint session in the Representatives' Hall, and His Excellency, the Governor, appeared and delivered his annual message.

2,000 copies of the message were ordered to be printed.

Ordinances of the Town of Olympia. Ordinance No. 3. An Ordinance to regulate the building of Side-walks on Main Street.

§ 1. Be it Ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Olympia, That the Town Marshal shall cause to be constructed as soon as practicable after the passage of this ordinance a good and substantial side-walk on both sides of Main Street from First to Union Street. The said side-walks shall be seven feet in width, of boards one and a half inches in thickness, laid at right angles with the said street on three substantial rails.

§ 2. All crossings of alleys to be built by and at the expense of the town.

§ 3. Street crossings to be raised high enough with shells or gravel, to afford dry crossings at all seasons.

§ 4. That said side-walks shall be built by the abutters thereupon, within two weeks after notice served upon them by the Town Marshal, and if not so done, said Marshal shall proceed to lay the said side-walk at the expense of the abutters thereupon; and if the expense be unpaid within thirty days after the completion of said work, ten per cent. shall be added as a penalty to said delinquent, and further proceedings shall be had as provided in the Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance to levy a Municipal Tax."

[SUPPLEMENTAL.] § 1. Be it Ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Olympia, That all that portion of the Ordinance to regulate the building of side-walks, which requires side-walks to be built on the west side of Main Street, south of the lot of Charles H. Mason, Esq., and between Fifth and Sixth Streets, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

§ 2. That the Town Marshal shall cause a side-walk to be built on the north side of Fourth Street, from Main Street to the first alley west of Adams Street, according to the provisions of the Ordinance to which this is a supplement; Provided, That instead of the gravel or shell crossings on the streets and alleys, a side-walk, similar to that built by the abutters may be constructed; And provided further, That said side-walk shall be six feet wide instead of seven feet.
