

CORROSION OF IRON.—In the universal use made at the present day of iron as a building material, it is found necessary to observe great care in joining it to other materials. When connected with wood, it causes decay of the adjoining parts; when with stone, it imparts its color by rusting; and when used for roofing, or other purposes where it is joined together in plates, it corrodes and damages not only itself, but everything around it. From some examinations which have been made of the materials employed to protect the bottom of iron ships, it would appear that nothing can be worse for the iron, at any rate when submerged in salt water, than red lead. Upon inspecting a ship which has been on a voyage to Calcutta and back, the red lead coating was found to be covered with blisters upon opening which a clear fluid escaped, and left the surface of the iron within covered with bright crystals of metallic lead. Each of these blisters, it was affirmed, was a minute galvanic battery—so that, as wherever there is electrical, there must be also, chemical action, the corrosion of the iron was easily accounted for. It was finally recommended that red lead should never be applied to sea-going steamers. It is stated that a pile of cannon balls coated with the usual paint and left in the open air, will in the course of twenty years become quite useless.

The discovery of the effect of a coating of zinc upon iron in an exposed situation has very much extended the use of this valuable material. Metals which do not have the same affinity for oxygen, when placed in contact produce an electrical current which passes from that having the most, to that having the least, affinity for oxygen. The zinc applied to iron not only acts as a direct coating, but protects it from galvanic influence by its more electro-positive character.

WHAT FRUITS SHALL I GROW.—As we have promised to give lists of the different fruits that should be grown, we shall select those we know have been successfully grown and well approved. That there are many other kinds of most excellent character, we do not deny; but where a few (half dozen) are wanted we shall give a few for each of the seasons, and enlarge for those who wish to grow greater varieties:

Summer Apples.—Early Strawberry, July to August; Early Harvest, July; Red Juneating, July; Red Astracan, July to August; Williams' Favorite, July to August; Large Yellow Bough, August.

Autumn Apples.—Gravestein, September to November; Alexander, September to October; Beauty of Kent, October to December; Porter, September; Rambo, October to December; Fall Pippin, October to December.

Winter Apples.—Bellflower, Yellow, November to February; Baldwin, December to March; Golden Russet, October to January; Rhode Island Greening, October to March; Blue Pearmain, October to February; Yellow Newtown Pippin, December to January.

Preserving and Cooking Apples.—Siberian Crab, Red and Yellow, most excellent; Holland Pippin; Smith's Cider, acid; Gloria Mundi; Roxbury Russet, very late; Jersey Sweet, baking.—*Cal. Farmer.*

CONVERTING BONES INTO SUPERPHOSPHATE.—If you have not a bone-mill, you must break the bones with sledge-hammers, and after with smaller ones, to reduce the bones to as small a size as possible; provide tubs, or a brick tank of sufficient capacity, to put in the bones, saturate them with hot water—pour in as much as they will absorb, but no more. Pour in sulphuric acid in the proportion of 56 pounds of the acid to 112 pounds of dry bones, stir the mass frequently, and in about a week it will be fit for use; first absorb the mass to a sufficiently dry state for distribution, by mixing with it dry earth, bog mould, ashes or peat charcoal in sufficient quantity. As the dissolved bones lose by evaporation, it would be better to put off the process of dissolving until it is required for use; it will then be perfectly disintegrated or decomposed in time for use. If tanks or tubs are not convenient, the process may be effected by saturating the bones on a dry floor under cover, and mixing them up with acid, as mortar is tempered, and immediately covering up the heap with drying materials, and left to digest for a week or ten days, when it is turned over and thoroughly mixed with the drying materials.—*Irish Farmer's Gazette.*

PLANTING LAWTON BLACKBERRIES.—The remarkable growth of the Lawton Blackberry in this county demands for it a much larger space than is usually given to it, and from our observation and experience we are led to recommend the following plan:

Select a very rich piece of fine-grained land, a sandy, black loam. Let it be very deeply sub-soiled, to give the roots power to draw up moisture. Repeated plowings, to make the soil perfectly fine, is better. Then plant the vines in rows eight feet apart, and six feet apart in the rows. Shorten the plants when set out. Water them when planted, if the earth is not moist. After the first year, the vines will always require pruning, to induce them to yield extra-sized berries.—*Cal. Farmer.*

MORE than Fourteen Hundred Donation Papers, (Notifications and Final Proofs), are now lying in the pigeon-holes of the Register's Office, all on which certificates can be issued as soon as FULL and COMPLETE COPIES ARE MADE. To do the whole of that work would require the constant labor of the Register from two to three years, provided that he had no other duties to perform. But when it is known that two-thirds of his time is occupied with conflicting donations and pre-emption cases, persons having donation papers in the office may well look to the future for their certificates and Patents. Believing that many would prefer having their donations completed now, rather than wait for the indefinite "course of human events," and being well acquainted with the business, I am prepared to make out papers and procure Certificates for claimants in all parts of the Territory. I will also attend to the preparation and filing of declaratory statements and final proofs for pre-emptions, and drawing maps of claimants and Townships, from the original surveys, for those desiring them. For preparing the papers and procuring a certificate for a donation claim, where there is no conflict, my charge is five dollars. For preparing and filing declaratory statements and paying the government for three dollars. For Township maps, five dollars, and claim maps one dollar each.
