

A CLERICAL JOKER.

The late Elder John Smith, of Kentucky, who died recently at an advanced age, was one of the most eccentric wits south of the Ohio river—a true gentleman. He was familiarly known throughout Kentucky as "Raccoon Smith." While still in the Baptist ministry, and attending one of the annual meetings of that body, a tall, lank, green specimen of humanity presented himself before the association as a candidate for the ministry. He was not regarded as being of entirely sound mind, and labored under the hallucination that he was especially "called to preach," and kept constantly importing the association to grant him the necessary license. In addition to his particularly unbalanced mind, young Meeks was the possessor of a huge and ungainly pair of feet as ever trod shoe leather. Tired of his importunities, and not being disposed to grant the license, the association handed him over to Smith, with instructions to make an end of the case; and between them took place the following conversation:

Smith—So Brother Meeks, you think you have a special call to preach?

Meeks—Yes, the Lord has called me to the work, but the association refuses me the license.

Smith—How do you know you are called?

Meeks—I know it! I feel it in my heart of hearts. I want my license.

Smith—Do you believe the Bible, Brother Meeks?

Meeks—Certainly I do, every word of it.

Smith—If I can prove by the Bible that you are not called to preach, will you be satisfied to drop the matter, and not importune the association for a license?

Another Meeks assented to this, and Raccoon Smith deliberately opened the New Testament at Romans X, 15, and in a grave tone read: "How beautiful are the feet of them who preach the Gospel of peace," etc., and then, glancing at Meeks' large flat feet, he remarked: "You see, Brother Meeks, that the feet of the preacher are beautiful. You, sir have the most monstrously ugly feet of any man in the State of Kentucky; therefore, by this Bible, it is clear that you have not been especially called."

As Smith finished his remarks, the entire association went off into a paroxysm of laughter; and Meeks, really concluding that he had not been "called," bolted from the meeting hoarse, and never after annoyed the association for a license.

A VICTORIA HORROR.—On Monday, the 17th inst., the dead body of a man was found lying upon the floor of the post-house barn, with a bullet hole in his head. The body was dressed in the clothing of a laborer, which was all clean, the shoes were freshly blacked showing no dirt upon their soles or evidence of having been walked in since they were cleaned, and no deadly weapon was to be found about the premises. Thus far, the affair presented very mysterious features. Upon the coroner's inquest the body was identified by the land lord of the Angels Hotel as that of a boarder by the name of P. Stocker, lately from Scotland, who had not been seen at his house since the Friday before, and in a pocket of the clothing found upon the deceased was found a key which fitted a trunk left in Stocker's room, on opening of which a letter addressed to Mr. Morton was found, announcing the determination of deceased to commit suicide, and directing the disposal of his effects. The landlord do not recall Stocker as a quiet, gentleman, with means, and dressed well—very differently from the mean clothes in which he was found dead. His pistol and his clothing have been found in possession of the Indians, and the coroner says: The general impression is that Stocker committed suicide in the post-house barn on Thursday or Friday last; that he died almost instantly; that the Indians found the body and took the valuables and the pistol, while one of them exchanged his clothes and shoes for those of the dead man, and left the body, with the key and knife in the pants' pocket, as it was found on Monday. Had the rascals left the pistol, the case would have been plain enough at first; but the absence of the death-dealing weapon awakened suspicion of foul play which has resulted in the rain of the thieves.—*Dispatch.*

MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION.—The Presbytery of Oregon Presbyterians, has six members on Puget Sound. Four of the members met at Seattle, W. T., at the house of Rev. G. F. Whitworth, on Feb. 7, 1873, and the subject of an association coming up, the present was deemed an opportune moment for an organization. Without further delay, Rev. G. F. Whitworth was called to the chair and Rev. John Rea to the pen. The choice of a name was then made—"The Puget Sound Ministerial Association." Rev. G. F. Whitworth was chosen chairman, and Rev. Jno. Rea, Secretary, to serve for a period of twelve months. On motion, the Ruling Elders of the various fully organized churches were declared eligible to membership and office in the Association. The names of the absent Presbyters were enrolled, and the Secretary authorized to notify them of the organization. It was further resolved that a cordial invitation be sent to Rev. S. G. McGregor, of Victoria, V. I., and Rev. Mr. Jamieson, of New Westminster, B. C., of the Established Church of Scotland, to unite and co-operate with the Association in its work of strengthening the hands and hearts of Christian workers in this region, and advancing the interests of the kingdom of Christ. Rev. Theo. Crowl then led in prayer, after which the Association adjourned to meet at the call of the Chairman.
