M. M. Holmes, Secretary of the Washington Soldiers' Home, has made a report showing that the home is now ready to open on October 1st, 1901, was \$25,000.

Thomas Kane, the mail-carrier, who was drowned in Bellingham Bay a week ago Saturday, has been found on the beach by the use of the dog.

The State Treasury has received \$107 from the estate of Peter Smith, of Walkikami, five years having passed and no one appearing to claim the money.

The school population of Pacific county this year is 1,417. The per capita fund will approximate \$10 per pupil.

The body of Thomas McCullom, who was accidentally drowned in the White river at Slaughter, was recovered by a party of Indians.

Logging operations in Cowlitz county have practically ceased.

Professor Lilly, president of the Agricultural College, has applied to State Auditor Reed for a warrant on the College fund for \$1,200, for salary and expenses from May 1 to December 1, but Mr. Reed declines to comply with the Professor's request.
