CITY MATTERS.

A Special Salary Bill Created—Other Matters of Interest Considered.
All members of the City Council were present at the regular meeting, Wednesday night.
A current expense fund was created, by recommendation of the committee, out of which bills incurred since Jan. 1st, may be paid in cash. As it will take a lot of the revenue to keep up this fund, warrant holders will begin to jump whether, in reality, their redeemer liveth. The following were ordered paid from this fund:

Byrne asked whether a 10 per cent. reduction had been made on the officers' salaries on account of being paid from the current expense fund. The report was that they would not vote for the adoption of the report until such reduction was made. After a general discussion a motion by Lane was passed, to the effect that elective officers be paid from the current expense fund at a reduction of 10 per cent. from their fixed salaries. The report was then amended so that the current expense fund should pay ten per cent. less, in which shape it was accepted.
