Clump, ex-County Treasurer of Clallam county, convicted last Monday of misappropriating county funds, has been granted a new trial by Judge McClinton, on the ground that the County Treasurer's books, and other books and papers not admitted as evidence in the trial, were left in the room where the jury could see and examine them. The new trial is set for October 22d.

Referring to the statement going the rounds of the papers that Washington can raise everything but pepper, Philip Sellers, who has a garden at Fifteenth and Canal street, Seattle, says he has pepper trees growing as luxuriantly as ever he saw them in the East Indies.

The citizens of Hoquiam feel that better things are in store for them in the near future. The council has granted Harry C. Heermans, of Corning, N. Y., a franchise for a first-class water system; also a right of way for a proposed railway through the town, which, if constructed, will connect with the Northern Pacific at Aberdeen and run into the heavy timber belt to the north and west of Hoquiam.

At a late hour last Sunday evening, an unknown man, with a handker-



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
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
