FRIENDS OF SILVER. A RINGING MANIFESTO ISSUED BY MEMBERS OF CONGRESS.

To Effect Organization - Senator Butler Opposes Washburn's Plan - The Latest Political Gossip in Washington - Among the Leaders - Situation as Between Parties in the New Senate. WASHINGTON, D. C., March 5. - Special Correspondence. - The silver Republicans of the Senate and House issued a ringing manifesto to the country in the last days of the present Congress. It stated with great conciseness and energy their present political position. It declared a biding loyalty to the free and unlimited coinage of silver as the paramount issue of the remaining campaigns of the present century. While it did not announce the permanent affiliation of the silver Republicans with the Democratic party in national politics, it is a fact admitted by all the Senators and Representatives of this group that this intimate association is sure to continue until the Democratic party, in some unexpected manner reverts to the control of the gold element. Of course, no prominent Democrats believe any such change possible or have the slightest fear of the ability of the millions of Democrats who voted for Bryan to control the State convention of all the States of the Union against the few thousand who voted for Palmer. As for the former Democrats who voted for McKinley, they are not considered as in any way identified with the Democratic party. The new declaration by the silver Republicans through the medium of a letter, is characterized by the same terse and eloquent sentences which have marked the several announcements of these gentlemen in the last campaign exert so powerful an influence throughout the country. The same handwritings are noticeable in the construction of the letter. The declaration issued by the bolting Republicans of St. Louis, which was read to the convention by Senator Frank J. Cannon, of Utah; the subsequent letter issued by the bolting Colorado which contained the pathetic and patriotic reference to M. Teller, as "pointed out by the finger of God as a leader of the people's great battle for the restoration of the constitutional rights of silver"; and subsequent endorsement by the same of the greatest mineral belt of the composite construction. Senator Teller wrote a portion of the announcement of the bolters at St. Louis and Dubois, Hartman and Pettigrew also had a hand in its construction. The Colorado letter was prepared without Senator Teller's knowledge or counsel. The final announcement of purpose to support the Democratic national ticket was largely the work of Senator Cannon of Utah. In the new declaration all the Washington leaders of the silver Republican party joined and it was even more forcible than its predecessors, and is both historic and prophetic.
