HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Coal oil is just as nice for cleaning stained floors as turpentine, and the odor is no worse, and seems to go quicker.

Never allow dishes to become hot in the oven. It spoils the glazing, causing it to crack, and gives them a bad odor.

Skim the soup stock when it is just about to boil, and add a gill of cold water. Repeat this operation three or four times and the stock should be clear.

All table linen should be closely examined each week for fruit stains. Try boiling water first; if this does not start them, use oxalic acid in water rising out immediately in clear water.

When tablecloths begin to go to pieces you can make very nice everyday napkins of them by cutting in neat squares and hemming. If too coarse for that, make tea towels of them.

Don't bother to black the stove every morning. Once a week and a good coat is enough. When you have finished the work in the kitchen, take a sheet of old newspaper and crushing it, rub the warm stove vigorously all over.

A lettuce sandwich is very nice eating for a picnic. Boil eggs till they are crumbly and chop them fine and season with salt and pepper. Get nice, tender lettuce and pick it to finest shreds with the fingers.

Cooking Water.—Few people know how to cook water. The secret is in putting good fresh water into a neat kettle already quite warm, and setting the water to boil quickly, and then taking it right off to use in tea, coffee, or other drinks, before it is spoiled.

Paper Mats in a Kitchen.—To protect the floor around the cook-stove, stitch together on a sewing machine three or four large sheets of thick, brown paper.

OLD-TIME DEBATERS SURPRISED James Hamilton Lewis Entertains the National House.

James Hamilton Lewis, the Democratic representative from the State of Washington, entertained the House for nearly an hour the other day. That he can be entertaining when he tries was clearly in evidence.

He started out on a little 10-minute speech favoring concurrence in the Senate amendment permitting the immediate use for a survey of \$10,000 from the existing appropriation of \$150,000 for the construction of a great ship canal from Puget Sound to a fresh water harbor in Lake Washington which lies just back of the city of Seattle.

Washington Well Fortified. In view of the fact that the national capital was once taken and burned by a foreign enemy it is reassuring to know that a calamity so humiliating is not likely to occur again, even in case of sudden war.

For military and prudential reasons little has been allowed to be made known concerning the new works and the heavy ordnance recently installed below the city, but for some years engineers have been busy at the river forts. Some very formidable guns are now in position there, and a system of torpedo defenses has been perfected which would render the approach of an enemy's warships within 12 miles of Washington practically impossible.

The guns are protected on the water side by emplacement walls of stone and concrete 70 feet thick, and on the land side by redoubts for infantry. The rapidly increasing wealth and importance of Washington, the grand new public building and the vast sums of money and bullion in the treasury render these protective and defensive measures a matter of national importance and necessity.
