

Languages Number 860. The least learned are aware that there are many languages in the world, but the actual number is probably beyond the dreams of ordinary people. The geographer Baldi enumerated 860, which are entitled to be considered as distinct languages, and 3,000 which may be regarded as dialects.

Adulgers, another modern writer on this subject, reckons up 3,064 languages and dialects existing and which have existed.
