Weekly Crop Bulletin.

U. S. Department of Agriculture, Climate and Crop Bulletin, Washington Section, for the week ending Monday, June 26, 1899.

With the exception of the last two days the week was one of sunshine, although of a trifle less than normal warmth.

The dry and warm weather was of decided benefit in the section west of the Cascade mountains, crops growing rapidly. Potatoes have noticeably improved, and also oats on lowlands. Having begun; reports indicate that the crop will be heavy. Hops are making good progress, but lice are becoming so numerous that spraying is necessary.

In the Eastern Section reports indicate that, although grain is yet in good condition, it, as well as some other vegetation, is greatly in need of rain. Early wheat is heading; some in bloom. Barley is turning. Alfalfa has been cut in the Klickitat country. The strawberry season is well on in the Eastern Section; in the Western it is at its height.

Telegraphic reports Monday tell of copious rain at Spokane and Walla Walla; it is not known but hoped that the rain is quite general over the Eastern Section.
