HOW TO AVOID TYPHOID FEVER. This is the beginning of the season of typhoid fever and here are some rules for its prevention. The disease is usually contracted by way of the mouth, eating impure or poorly prepared foods, or drinking impure water.

The most common vehicle of transmission of typhoid fever is milk. Extra care should be taken to insure the purity of the family supply. Learn where the milk comes from, and unless you know that it is handled properly seek another dairyman.

Being assured that everything you eat and drink is pure and wholesome, the next step is to watch your general health and see that you do not get "run down." Every one takes into his system an untold number of active disease germs every year, and the reason that they do not become ill is that they are in a condition to throw off the poison.

See that nothing is allowed to accumulate on the premises that will produce germs, and there will be none. Have the cellar whitewashed throughout, and sprinkle lime in all damp corners and around the backyard.

Remember that nine-tenths of the precautionary measures are simply the application of the law, "Cleanliness is next to Godliness," and keep clean, and keep everything clean.
