A jury term of the Superior Court began Tuesday.  
A test of the fire-alarm service was made Wednesday.  
Counselman Wiman is confined to his home by illness.  
Ernest Uterback, of Eastside, is quite ill of typhoid fever.  
Al. Munson and wife, of Shelton, were in the city yesterday.  
A daughter was born to the wife of Frank D. Myers this week.  
Mrs. Pelletier, of Tacoma, is on a visit to her son, who is quite ill, at the hospital.  
Mr. and Mrs. Allan, of Creede, Col., are visiting their daughter, Mrs. Ray, of this city.

The Republicans have already taken preliminary action for placing a city ticket in the field.

Mr. Callow gains four votes in the official count, making his majority for Auditor of 29 over Hopkins.

Josie Innes, nine years of age, died at Meadow, in this county, on Wednesday of last week, of scarlet fever.  
The annual charity ball given by the Ladies' Relief Society will be held at the Hotel Olympia, on the evening of the 28th inst.

Geo. A. McDowell and Miss Louise Ferguson, of Tacoma, were united in marriage at the court-house by Rev. J. S. McCullum, Wednesday.  
"Uncle Josh Sprucey's" parade will take place immediately after the arrival of the Aberdeen Wednesday, on which steamer the company will arrive.  
It is reported that Frank J. Browne, having been defeated for the office of State Superintendent, is now seeking to fill Prof. Hawes' shoes as City Superintendent.  
Chas Green and wife have made formal application for adoption of Stowe Andrew Studley, a minor child, whose parents are dead, and who is now in charge of his grandfather.  
Another improvement in Olympia Theater is the removal of the ladies' dressing rooms to the stage floor, where they can be adequately heated and be more accessible to the stage work.  
A special venire for additional jury-men was issued in the Superior Court, Wednesday, and E. McReynolds, J. C. Waddell, J. S. McMahon, J. S. Beasley and Fred. Guyot were added to the panel.  
Prof. Hawes has received an offer of a better salary elsewhere, and has tendered his resignation of the position of City Superintendent. The gentleman has made a zealous and efficient officer.  
A seven-year-old daughter of A. J. Garrison, residing in the southern part of town, is afflicted with that dread disease, diphtheria. The premises are quarantined and it is hoped that the disease will not spread.  
Mr. and Mrs. Allen Weir, celebrated the 23rd anniversary of their wedding Monday evening. A few friends were present, refreshments served, and a progressive supper followed in a very pleasant evening for all.  
The jury in the case of Louch, Augustine & Co., of Seattle, vs. Kreider of this city, involving a demand for merchandise which defendant claimed had been paid, returned a verdict in favor of Kreider, yesterday.  
Dunn, the man charged with stealing Mrs. Stoll's watch, was declared guilty of the charge by a verdict of his peers yesterday, and now his attorneys propose to increase the bill of costs against the people by re-trial.  
Uncle Josh Sprucey will appear at Olympia Theater next Wednesday night. Besides a "rattling" good performance, this attraction brings its own orchestra and band, which, of course, includes a street parade.  
Dave E. Baily, the lawyer, has returned from San Francisco, where he has been the past month, engaged in business as well as in quest of health. Both objects have been attained by his short residence in the sunny State.  
In the contempt case against B. F. Corliss and Wood Doane, last Tuesday Judge Hodgdon fined the former \$65 and the latter \$35. The contempt consisted in disobeying an order of Judge Linn in a case pending.  
Elmer Epperson, who shot Edward Lange a few weeks ago, stood trial at this term of court, and the jury, Wednesday, returned a verdict of guilty of assault and battery. He is lucky in getting off so easily, and it is hoped that his experience may be a lesson to him.  
The case against D. T. Calderwood, the Tenino school teacher, for immorally whipping Frank Warren, a pupil, was withdrawn Monday, on

petition of plaintiff's mother, supported by Prosecuting Attorney Funk. This ends, what promised to be, at one time, locally, a noted case.  
The celestial display promised for Tuesday night—post-poned from last year's November 13—may have taken place, but the "London" fog, thick enough to cut with a knife, which has prevailed the past few nights, shut out the show from at least Western Washington observers. It may have taken place, or it may not; the fact in either case must be established by other than local eyewitness testimony.

The sound papers having agitated the matter of securing permanent fair grounds for Western Washington, Olympia arises to announce that Woodland, near this city, where the best race courses in the State already exist, would be an ideal place for development of such an institution. Nature has supplied about all the natural requirements, about \$30,000 has been spent in fences, club-room and out-buildings. The Legislature will be asked for appropriation, but of course, both Seattle and Tacoma are reaching out for the little plum, and it will doubtless be "permanently located" at one or the other place.  
Oly has a story that Patrick Henry Scullin, of Seattle, (from which city all good things come) has appeared in this city with a demand that 72 of state appointments be accorded the "Adopted Sons of Washington," an order evidently partaking somewhat of the nature of the once notorious Know Nothing party, which worked itself into success in some quarters by passwords, cryptic grammar and dark lanterns. Mr. Scullin declares that this was the club that hit Rogers and sent him to the top of the heap, and that unless these 72 sons receive recognition, something will surely drop. We await anxiously with averted ear. One, two, three—let 'er drop!  
A Splendid New England Play.  
The Seattle Times of the 5th inst., has this to say of the "Uncle Josh Sprucey" Company, which appears at Olympia Theater, next Wednesday evening, the 21st inst.:  
"One of the largest audiences ever assembled at a theatrical performance in Seattle greeted 'Uncle Josh Sprucey' at the Grand Opera House last night. The box office closed and standing room was yet clamoring for tickets. At least 2,500 people watched the performance, while many others sought other places of amusement, finding they could not get inside.  
"The play deals with a rich but plain old farmer whose only daughter is induced to elope and go to New York with a gambler and counterfeiter. Uncle Josh follows and carries her back with him, but not until a tragedy has resulted from his interference.  
"Then follow scenes on the farm and in Uncle Josh's sawmill, where the villain husband appears and binds the wife on a saw-log, before a swiftly revolving circular saw. Uncle Josh opportunely arrives and rescues the daughter. A huskin' bee concludes the comedy. The first act shows Uncle Josh on the old homestead surrounded by his family and friends.  
"In the second act the old farmer visits New York and gets up at a swell hotel. He meets a bunco steerer on Broadway and gets touched for a big roll. His experiences with the bunco sharps and green goods men are comical in the extreme.  
"The third act introduces a real live circular saw cutting lumber on the stage, with the thrilling spectacle of the heroine lying unconscious across the log and being carried toward the swiftly moving saw. While the spectators are holding their breath in suspense Uncle Josh rushes in just in the nick of time to snatch his daughter from impending death.  
"The huskin' bee is a barn scene, where country people, a country band, with the old-fashioned country fiddler, hold forth. A number of pleasing specialties are introduced—Clark and the Gilmores doing a neat turn and the brass quartette.  
"The descriptive music by the orchestra, in particular, 'The Dance of the Goblins,' is well rendered.  
"Capt. Hatch's New Steamer.  
"The hull of a fast steamer has been launched at Whatcom. The vessel will be known as the Gen. Frisbie, and is being built for the Monticello Steamship Co. (Hatch Bros.) of San Francisco. It is intended for excursions, will have no berths and will be equipped with 1,200-horsepower engines, which are expected to drive the vessel through the water at the rate of 20 knots an hour. The Gen. Frisbie is 170 feet over all, 160 feet keel, 23 feet beam, 13 feet hold, and is intended to carry about 800 passengers. The hull is to be loaded with fir timber, in addition to the wood-work for the cabins, etc., and will be towed to San Francisco where the engines will be installed.  
"Accident at the Mallory Mill.  
"A peculiar accident took place at the Mallory mill, about three miles west of town yesterday. It seems that Fred Tucker, the engineer, was called away from his engine temporarily, and while in another part of the building, an employe of the mill attempted to start the machinery. The engine, as frequently happens, stopped 'on the center,' and to get the crank beyond the point where power ceases, the employe used a scumling to pry the pit-man out of line, leaving the throttle open. The result is what might have been expected by anybody familiar with machinery. In an instant the scumling was sent flying like a shot from a cannon. It unfortunately struck Tucker in the hip, dislocating it, and badly bruising his body in other places. It is thought that if the timber had struck him squarely the result would have been instant death.  
"The vintage of dry wine in California this year excels in quality rather than quantity. The high standard of 1893 will be attained. The product will be about 15,000,000 gallons of dry and 7,000,000 of sweet wine, in that State this season.

A PARTY FORECAST.  
HOW FUTURE OF DEMOCRACY LOOKS AT WASHINGTON.  
No Cause to Despond—The People will Surely Awaken to the Importance of Change, in Time—Cheerfulness and Confidence Seem to Animate the Party Leaders—The Present Cabinet will Scatter at the Beginning of the New Term.  
From our regular correspondence.  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 9, 1900.  
Because Hanna and the trusts have by the use of like methods secured the same result as in 1890—the defeat of the will of the people—is no reason for the Democratic party to change or abandon a single one of its vital principles. On the contrary, it furnishes a strong reason for the continued agitation of Democratic principles. If the power of the corporate rings and trusts which now dominate this government is ever to be broken and our government again be put back upon the constitutional foundation laid by our wise forefathers, it must be done by the Democratic party, the only party which recognizes the limits set by our constitution. It is the Democratic party to which that portion of the misguided masses which have, for a sad reason, joined in voting the industrial yoke upon their own shoulders will turn for relief when experience shall have taught them—as it will—the grievous mistake they have made. Let every Democrat see that the party is kept in condition to respond when that appeal for help is made.  
Most Democrats are rather glad than otherwise that the Republicans secured the control of the House along with the Presidency. As Tom Reed remarked when the Democrats met with similar success, "Let the tail go along with the hide." If the Democrats had elected a majority of the next House, the Republicans would have made use of that control to perfectly absolve themselves of anything that was done or left undone during the first two years of Mr. McKinley's second term. With the President, the Senate and the House, they must accept full responsibility for what is done and what is left undone, which cannot fail to be beneficial to the Democratic party in the end. Watchfulness and aggressiveness should be the Democratic watchwords from this time on, until the people again place it in control of the government.  
Hon. A. S. Dulin, of New Jersey, who was a visitor at Democratic Congressional headquarters since the election, says the Republicans carried that State by the infamous Dudley block five system by which Indiana was carried for Harrison the year he was elected, only they arranged the voters in blocks of ten. Mr. Dulin called attention to the fact that the Democrats held their own in the Congressional districts of New Jersey.  
One of the first official acts of the administration after it was known that Mr. McKinley was re-elected was to ask Great Britain, through the Department of State, to drive the Filipino junta out of Hong Kong, which is British territory. There is no doubt that the request will be complied with, as was a similar request concerning the Spanish officer who went from Washington to Canada at the opening of the war with Spain, and sought to conduct a Spanish secret information bureau there. It is evident that this thing had all been fixed up before the election, but for some reason Mr. McKinley was afraid to have it known before the voting. As the request is a perfectly natural one, the only reason for any concealment in connection therewith seems to lie in the reason "Conscience makes cowards."  
Representative Sharp, of Mississippi, who is now in Washington, calls attention to the fact that if the gains made by Mr. Bryan in the East could have been transferred to some of the close States the result would have been different. The more the popular vote is studied, the plainer it becomes that there is no reason for Democrats to become discouraged over the future of the party.  
As soon as they were sure that Mr. McKinley was re-elected the Republicans began the squabble over the official plums of the next administration, and it is likely to grow hotter and hotter until the distribution is made. At least four members of the Cabinet are slated for voluntary retirement. Attorney General Griggs, whose extensive trust practice was said to be worth something like \$100,000 a year to him when he resigned the Governorship of New Jersey, is to enter the Cabinet because of the relations between him and the late Vice President Hobart, is anxious to quit public life and get rich; Secretary Long, who already has a fortune, wishes to retire and take things easy; Postmaster General Smith is said to prefer returning to his editorial desk to remaining in public life, and Secretary Hay has not enjoyed his public position since he was so harshly and generally criticized for being over-friendly with England and the English. Secretaries Gage, Hitchcock, and Wilson will, according to current gossip, be members of the new Cabinet. Perry Heath, who so strongly endorsed Neely, the Cuban postmaster, and who resigned the position of First Assistant Postmaster General to become Secretary of the Republican National Committee and Hanna's personal representative in the management of the campaign, is said to have told friends that he would be Postmaster General under the second McKinley administration, unless he concluded not to accept the portfolio. If he isn't Postmaster General it will not be because he declines to accept. That much may be set down as certain.  
OUR Russian neighbors seem to have instituted a very commendable reform, if the announcement by cable is true that the police of Kiev have placed the theaters under surveillance, and issued an order that waits between acts shall not be longer than fifteen minutes and that no actor shall be applauded more than three times during the same performance. If they had an Olympia gallery to deal with, however, they would soon discover the futility of limiting either the quality or quantity of approval by the "gods."  
A quid nunc wants to know what has become of that "nit" on the head of the State ticket as published in this paper. Well, that is easily answered. It has followed the order of nature and developed into the pediculus capitis, the most disgusting of parasites.

THE CHINA LOCUST PLAGUE.  
Will Chinamen and Japs Be Allowed to Absorb the Oyster Trade?  
ED. STANDARD:  
Dear Sir: I read with much interest in last week's STANDARD an article in regard to the human locust, known as the Chinaman. Let me give you some facts that bear out your editorial in regard to them. Some 15 or 16 years ago, there was not a Chinaman at work on Oyster Bay in the oyster business; to-day them and the Japs are the only workmen employed by the oystermen. A few years ago white men and Indians were employed and their money spent with our home merchants; to-day the money goes to bring more of the human locusts to our once free and happy country, that is not the worst of it by far, as they are robbing the people of this State in a barbed manner by tonging oysters out of grounds that belong to the people of the State. Is a Chinaman or a Jap allowed to tong oysters on a State reserve? They are not, but that is what they have been doing for years. There are Chinamen on the bay who are making from \$75 to \$120 a month, and the biggest part of that is stolen from the humble taxpayers and their little children, for generally the oysters came from the State reserve beds. I defy any one of the Chinese lovers to disprove a word of the above. They are now making plans to get laws passed to get it for their own private use. Will the people stand by? The man with two or three acres of oyster land needs that much oyster seed for himself and children. Is he going to stand by and see the Chinese and his employer, who now makes \$300 or so a week, steal the bread from the mouths of his little children?  
We admire John Miller Murphy's stand in the matter of Chinese. He has courage enough to state his convictions and should be supported by all fair-minded men, no matter what party they claim.
