Jim Connelly, of the firm of Connelly & Chambers, was in Mason county the greater portion of the week looking after that firm's extensive interests there. Besides having a branch meat market at Shelton, this firm operates the Webb ranch, at Twana, and is in charge of Mr. C. F. Kaler.

Miss Belle Melvin finished her term of school at Woodland last Friday and held a very interesting entertainment that was attended by a large number of people of the neighborhood. Miss Melvin has been engaged as teacher in the Everett schools commencing the first week in September.

The motto of the local telephone exchange seems to be "Onward." The improvements made last year, which placed it in the lead of exchanges in cities of its class, have been supplemented by steady extension of the service, and as every subscriber added enhances its value to all others, its efficiency is being constantly and materially increased.

Strawberries have not been less than 12 cents a box in our markets this season, and the first of the home crop sent the prices up 20 cents, after it had been stationary at the "bit" rate for eight weeks at different places. That cheap berries will be very scarce this year, as the cold weather causes the ripening to be so protracted as to prevent a glut of the product.

The contractors have done a good job in planking Fourth street, by using "sized" lumber and affording a steeper incline towards the gutter, which will tend to keep the planking dry in the rainy season, when the greatest loss from decay is experienced. The job is now about completed and the surface, the whole distance from Jefferson to Main, is as smooth as a dancing-floor.

One great improvement noted in the management of the Gentry horse and dog show was that everybody who paid the price of admission had an opportunity to witness the performance. The "reserved" seats were no better than those given on general admission, which were at the side of the ring where a full view of all that transpired could be obtained. Besides being an exhibition of at least equal merit, the Gentry people's entire management was marked by a much better spirit of reciprocal favor than the Norris show.

The session of the Capitol Commission, held Monday, was attended by only three members—Governor McBride, Auditor Atkinson and Van Pierson—and the business transacted was merely routine work. An application of Contractor Goss to make some minor changes in the wiring was granted, and Architect Ritchie was directed to prepare plans for the vaults, with a view of calling for bids for the doors to the strong-box. The Commission adjourned to the 20th

inst. when the bids for furnishing the Legislative chambers will be considered.

Attorney Henston, of Tacoma, has asked for a dismissal without prejudice of the famous tideland case of Robert B. Lehman against Robert Bridges, the late State Land Commissioner. The suit was to quiet title to certain tidelands adjacent to Seattle and Tacoma, sold by the Commissioner as first-class land. Lehman made application for similar land as second class, and on carrying the case to the higher court received a favorable opinion. The question now is: Does the title to the lands sold as first-class become invalid from its improper classification? It seems that the decision of the court did not go far enough to definitely determine that matter, and that a suit will be started to cover the point yet undetermined.

After a long, weary wait, the leader of the circus band came out, smoothed his hair down, and put a cut of tobacco in his mouth, and after three or four times, the leader's mouth, by the way, was a wonder. When he opened it to blow the cornet it looked like the mouth of the Hoo Sac tunnel.

The first act was a living pyramid of horse flesh. It was a beautiful sight to see those little ponies pruned around the trainer and go through the different marches and counter-marches at the word of command. Weekly Crop Bulletin.

The following report of climatic conditions for the week ending on June 24, is from the Seattle weather station:

An unusually warm spell at the beginning of the week, during which the maximum temperature was between 80 and 90 degrees at different places, was followed by a steady decrease in temperature, and on the 29th there were cold showers, with hail mingled. On the morning of the 30th there was light frost in some localities of the county. The hail did some damage to young fruit, and the frost slightly injured tender vegetables. The dry spell with the three warm days warmed up the soil so that the crops have grown well, notwithstanding the cool weather of the greater part of the past week.

Grass, clover, alfalfa and grain of all sorts have flourished. Considerable alfalfa is now about ready for cutting; a small amount has been cut. Wheat, both spring and winter, is in very satisfactory condition. The reports from the Palouse country are extremely favorably. Barley in Columbia county, and oats in Skagit county, are above the average. Hops are making good progress. Early potatoes are in blossom and looking splendid; late ones are growing nicely, except on very wet soils. Sugar beets are in satisfactory condition.

Good reports come from the peach sections, east of the mountains, and the outlook for apples is, on the whole, favorable. But cherries, prunes and pears have dropped off so that only a small crop is left. Strawberries are ripening with favorably weather for the next two weeks the crop will be large.

**THE TAX-PAYERS' LEAGUE.**

The Sage of Yelm Unable to Present But There in Spirit.

Mr. J. C. Conine, of Yelm, who was unavoidably prevented from attending the organization of the Taxpayers' League, last Saturday, has this to say to one of its promoters regarding the object of its organization:

"The apathy of the people on political and economic questions is beyond my comprehension. I think you can corroborate my assertion, when I say I have written more for publication over excessive taxation. In my opinion the primary cause of high taxes is the failure of corporations to pay their proportionate tax. Our court expenses are more than twice as much as they ought to be. In fact the expenses of the State could easily be reduced one-half, if the logging could be dispensed with. The loggers were rooted out in '96, after a 'Rip Van Winkle sleep' of 20 years on the part of the people, and its about time they had another application of popular indignation. Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty," as well as the price the people have to pay to keep the loggers from looting. I am not certain that the jury fees are excessive when we consider that jurors have to serve under compulsion. A juror who is forcibly taken from his home and compelled to sit for an indefinite length of time, at the option of the lawyers, and listen to their harrangues, certainly ought to be entitled to as much consideration from a financial point of view, as the lawyer, but he don't get it.

"I think the most important improvement is so large that the League will have little trouble in interesting the people in some united action for their own benefit. The main thing is to set the people to thinking and the first thing is to give them facts to think about.

**Successful Career of a Thurston County Boy.**

Mr. W. T. Melvin, of Yelm, is the recipient of letters from his son "Bob," who is employed as an overseer in the great work of tunneling under the Harlem river, New York, for the Rapid Transit Company, at a salary of \$500 per month. It seems that he had been at work on a pier of the new Brooklyn bridge, at a salary of \$200, but that rival contractors on the rapid transit had ascertained the fact that Mr. Melvin combined experience with stability, and were determined to have him at any cost, which is a notable tribute to a humble beginning which had inspired confidence.

Robert was born upon a farm in the county of Durham, England, in 1839, and was the oldest of a family of eleven raised by W. T. Melvin. He attended school three years in a country parish in Warwickshire, eight miles from Stratford on Avon, and at the age of 12 came to this country with his parents, settling on a New York Dakota farm. In 1888 he was employed in the carshops of the Northern Pacific, and came West working at Sprague, Edison, Cosmopolis and Tacoma, for a company, and at Fairhaven for a firm of bridge contractors. In 1893, he and his younger brother were induced to go to New York and work on a causeway over the Harlem at Highbridge. They had charge of building the caisson to use in construction of a pier for the suspension bridge, "Bob" as overseer and "Will" in charge of the machinery, the latter receiving \$100 per month. On this work the former received \$200, until he accepted the position of still greater responsibility on the Rapid Transit Tunnel.

The success attending the career of these boys, is noted to inspire a spirit of emulation among others who have an equal opportunity for making life a success from a financial point of view. The elder of these brothers was never at school after he was 12 years of age, and his brothers have feared no better so far as the usual educational equipment is concerned.

The Melvin family moved to this State in 1893. They rented and operated the Dunham farm on Chambers prairie a year, the Smith farm near by three years, and are now managing the Capen stock ranch of 800 acres at Yelm. A third brother is employed by the Rapid Transit Company as an artificer, and is doing quite well. Miss Belle Melvin, the popular teacher at Woodland, is a sister.

Robert Melvin is a son-in-law of H. F. Meays of this city.
