HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

HOMELY WRINKLES.

When steaming vegetables, don't put any water with them.

Keep butter closely covered, so it won't taste of anything near it.

If the stove is greasy put a little soapuds in with the blacking.

Try putting a little salt in the water in which matting is washed.

Remember to wash the hands and clean the finger nails before cooking.

Cook cereals hours and hours in a double boiler the day before serving.

Sweep the screen wire occasionally. The dust and lint which gather on it prevent the free passage of air.

If potatoes are mealy remove them from the kettle when boiled with a long-handled skimmer, instead of a fork.

By taking a nap each day, it only for a few minutes. It will make you feel more cheerful, hopeful and capable.

Peas fresh from the garden cook in about half the time they would need if kept a day longer, and are twice as sweet.

After a dry, dusty spell of weather, how glad the trees must be to stand up to the rain and hold out their leaves to feel it splashing on them.

To keep the cellar cool and dry, close the windows and blinds to exclude the sun and heat. Ventilate only at night and the cooler portions of the day.

For ants, soak a sponge in molasses and water, squeeze out, place upon a saucer where ants are troublesome, scald occasionally and sweeten again; that's all, sure.

During the hot, dry weather of summer wet the roots of sweet pea vines liberally, being careful not to wet the vines. If you wish vines to bloom freely do not allow any seed to form.

CALL FOR DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION.

A Democratic County Convention for Thurston County, Washington, is hereby called to meet in Olympia, Washington, on Saturday, August 30, 1902, at 10 o'clock a. m. in the city hall, for the purpose of nominating a full ticket for legislative and county officers for said county and for the purpose of electing delegates to represent the county in the next Democratic State Convention.

The basis of representation for each precinct shall be one delegate for each ten votes or the major fraction thereof cast for the Hon. Yancy Blalock as a candidate for Presidential Elector in the general State election of 1903. The apportionment of each precinct is as follows:

The delegation to said convention shall be chosen by mass meetings to be held in the various county precincts, on Tuesday, August 26, 1902, at such hour as the local chairman may select for the cities of Olympia and Turnwater Tuesday, August 26, 1902, at 8 o'clock p. m., the places of holding the said mass meetings are as follows:

Olympia, Third ward, Union block.
Olympia, Fourth ward, O. C. I. building.
Turnwater precinct, Geo. Gelbach's office.
Bucoda precinct, old school house.

Tenino, Sumption's store.
Grand Mount, school house.
Little Rock, hall.
Rochester, school house.
Baiter, school house.
McLane, school house.

The County Central Committee recommends that an alternate be elected for each delegate and that no proxies be allowed in the convention.

All persons who would be qualified electors at a general election and who desire to assist in the election of the Democratic ticket at the ensuing election shall be qualified to vote at the mass meetings herein called.

This call is made in pursuance of a resolution adopted at a meeting of the Thurston County Democratic Committee held in the City of Olympia on the 9th day of August.

Consideration of the following was recommended:

WHEREAS, As the primaries are peculiarly the forum of the people, the source of all power under our government, and that the Democratic party, in accordance with time-honored traditions, hereby renounces its faith in the people, believing them to be virtuous, intelligent and patriotic, and

WHEREAS, There is ample power, under the State Constitution, to enact laws fair and just to all, especially in the matter of taxation, and

WHEREAS, For more than ten years of trial it has been demonstrated that the revenue laws which have been placed upon our statute-books have utterly failed to deal justly as between corporations and the people, especially as respects railway corporations; therefore be it
