An enjoyable ball was held at Kalmiche Saturday night. Mrs. Phil Skillman returned Monday from a visit to Seattle. The New York Bakery has been removed to 211 Fourth street. Mrs. E. N. Tunin is home from an extended sojourn in California. Mrs. Cora Ayer and children have returned from a visit to California. J. E. Calder, a prominent citizen of Montesano, was in the city yesterday. "Clover Hill" has already bought his reception suit for the Presidential levee. The roof of the capitol annex is about ready for the galvanized iron shingles. Miss Jessie Wilcox, of the Recorder, has taken a day's off to visit relatives in Des Moines, Iowa. She will be absent about a month or more. Poor old "Ucle Tom" died again, Saturday night, in Olympia Theater. The "house" was small, and the few that were present "won't own it." W. A. Wherrett, has been appointed guardian of his minor children, and has secured an order of court to sell the real estate and personal property of their mother, now deceased. Mr. Wherrett resides at Tenino.

T. L. Brown, of this city, has sold a quarter section of fine timber land in Pacific county to the Young brothers of Olympia. The price paid was \$2,000. Mrs. Bathar Mitchell has bought two lots corner of Jefferson and Sixth streets, lots 1 and 2, block 56, of Sylvester plat. The consideration was \$350. A. S. Nichols, a son of the Secretary of State, was in the city from Everett this week. While here he bought eleven Jersey cows for shipment to his home city. The survey for the route of the Capital City Traction Co., for a street railway on Westside, was begun yesterday by J. B. Waddell, engineer of the company. Ray Freeland, deputy of the State Treasurer, and Miss Ethel Houghton, a sister of Printing Expert Frank T. Houghton, were united in marriage, at Tacoma, Wednesday. The Odd Fellows of this city propose to celebrate the anniversary of the order which this year falls on Sunday, on the succeeding Monday, the 27th inst., by a social and banquet. Stult, of Colfax, has been appointed a member of the State Board of Examiners, to succeed the term of Dr. W. D. Tucker, of Port Townsend, which expired on the 22d ult. Mr. and Mrs. Will R. White will make our city their home during the summer. Mr. White will be engaged in the State bar line survey soon to begin in front of Hoquiam and Aberdeen. Capt. Fred Tew has organized the Olympia Tug and Barge Co., and by aid of the steamers Blue Star and Sophia, with two barges, is prepared to meet all the requirements in that line at this time. Dr. Redpath and wife are about to finish a building flip, being now leisurely on their way home. They will return by way of San Francisco and are expected here about the 5th of next month. It seems that the roof of the capitol annex is practically wood after all. There are two dwellings on the place and Mr. and Mrs. Holthusen will live in the one facing on Fifth street. Frank Martin was brought in from Jamnien camp at Mud Bay, Saturday, suffering from a fatal accident, both legs being broken by a rolling log. He was taken to the hospital, and is getting along as well as could be expected from the magnitude of his injuries. Rev. Clarence E. Eberman, Field Secretary of the United Society of Christian Endeavor, died of typhoid pneumonia, at Baul, N. W. T., on the 13th. He addressed large audiences in this city about three weeks ago, and impressed his auditors with his rare eloquence. Elbert J. Williams met instant death Monday afternoon, at Patterson's lake, in Avery's logging camp, by two heavy logs passing over him while engaged in unloading a car of timber. He left a wife and two children, and carried insurance to the amount of \$2,000 in the A. O. U. W. Fred Bell, well-known here, was united in marriage to Miss Mamie Sullivan, at Seattle, Wednesday. Mr. and Mrs. Bell will take up their residence at Potlatch, in Mason county, where the groom is employed as a logging engineer for the Phoenix Logging Company. Robert Bowers and Edward Stevenson, arrived a few days ago from Marshall county, Kansas, to spy out the land, with the view of a possible location. Robt. Stevenson, who has been a resident here about a year, is a brother of one of the parties, and Mr. Bowers is his nephew. Our Attorney-General, after he had ascertained the merger suit had been decided in favor of the State with others in the Circuit Court, left for Washington to argue the Johnsen case before the Supreme Court. If he isn't in at the "killing," he may do some barking over the result. The State has become the owner of 220 acres of prairie ground on American Lake, near Tacoma, for the use of the encampment grounds of the National Guard of the State. A. R. Tittle decided the property to the State for the consideration of \$30 per acre, or \$6,600 for the entire piece. DEATH OF ANOTHER PIONEER.

Joseph H. Munson Passes to the Unknown Shore. Joseph H. Munson who died in the Seattle General Hospital, last Saturday night, is entitled to more than casual mention, from the fact that he was so long a prominent factor in our local progress. Mr. Munson came to Puget Sound as Second Mate of the bark Toanoo, in 1850, of which vessel G. D. Keller, now Captain and is son, A. W. Keller, was First Mate. They made the trip around the Horn in six months, considered good time for those days. On the long voyage around the Horn an attachment sprang up between the young Second Mate and Miss Emily, the daughter of Capt. Keller. They were married just one week after the arrival of the bark at Port Townsend, the wedding taking place in the old "Bell" hotel. The young couple soon afterward moved to Steilacoom, then the leading town on the American side of Puget Sound. A strong friendship existed between Henry L. Yesler, the owner of the main part of the town, and Mr. Munson, and Mr. Yesler offered the young man a block in the then sawmill town of Seattle if he would move there, but Steilacoom seemed to have brighter prospects, and Mr. Munson stayed there. He could have taken up a homestead, which would have stood along with A. A. Denny, Maynard, Bell and others, but he preferred to come to Olympia. In the early Territorial days Mr. Munson was quite a prominent character in politics. He was Treasurer and Librarian of the Territory, was Postmaster of Olympia for twelve years, and was Treasurer of Thurston county for twelve years. In 1880, the year Washington was admitted as a State, Mr. Munson moved to Seattle, and made that city his home from that time until his death. After his removal from the capital he did not take an active part in politics, and he and his wife made their home with their two sons out on the shores of Lake Washington. Deceased was a member of harmony lodge No. 1 of Masons of Olympia. He reared a family of seven children in Washington. The eldest is Mrs. U. Grant, now living in Alameda. Her first husband was Lincoln P. Ferry, a son of Governor Eliah P. Ferry. Mrs. J. D. Van Buren, another daughter, is also living in Alameda, Cal. Albert J. Munson is Postmaster at Shelton and Lewis and Clark are also residents of Shelton. Charles H. is Captain and J. K. Munson is engineer of the Emily T. Keller, the boat being named for their mother. Death was caused from pneumonia, contracted about ten days ago. His sons were at his side with their mother when death came. The funeral took place Monday morning, and interment was made in Lake View Cemetery. The pallbearers were all old-time Olympians, being S. L. Crawford, C. B. Bagley, L. A. Trean, R. S. Weston, Griffith Davis and Charles Prosch. Probably no resident of the capital city has possessed so many distinguished traits of individuality as William H. Munson. He would have made an admirable character for the graphic word-pictures of a Dickens. While he was steadfast in what he conceived to be matters of principle, he belonged to the so-called liberal world of thought, and believed that Bob Ingersoll was about the culmination of earthly wisdom. He was a steadfast temperance advocate and a stalwart Republican, but that he could hold no trust those who had a place in the hearts of his friends. He was a man of cheerful habits and of much quiet humor. He always had a smile for friends or foe, but of the latter, except those who differed with him in religion, he had very few. He was his own "worst enemy," inasmuch as he never had a closed hand to the voice of suffering, and he died poor although his opportunities for achieving wealth were many, and an ample competency was spent in the aid of others. His only brother, Frank Munson, lives near Shelton.

DEATH OF MRS. RUTLEDGE.

She Was a Resident of this County Over Half a Century. Pheobe Jane Rutledge, who died on the night of the 10th in this city, was buried Sunday, in the cemetery on Bush prairie, Rev. A. W. Anderson, of Gate City, and Rev. E. Hopkins, of South Union, officiating at the rites. Deceased came to Olympia in 1859 and had resided in this vicinity ever since. She had been an invalid from chronic stomach troubles for eight years, and for six weeks confined to her bed, and the last month was with her daughter, Mrs. James Israel, in this city, to ensure that care which the severity of her illness demanded. Her other children are eight in number and are: Mrs. K. Baker of this city; Mrs. Nellie M. Bradley of Bucodur; Mrs. Myrtle J. Sullivan of Rochester; Mrs. Elsie J. Sargent of Tacoma; Mrs. Maggie J. Eshom of Porter; Mrs. Nancy A. Shotwell of Mima prairie, and two sons, Geo. W. Rutledge of Rotherst and James M. Rutledge of Little Rock. Two children, Mrs. Mary E. Miles and John L. Rutledge, are dead. Mrs. Rutledge was born October 12, 1835, in Posey county, Ind., making her 67 years of age. She was married to her surviving husband December 25, 1859, in Indiana, and came west with him and their three elder children in 1859. They settled on a ranch at Little Rock, where they resided until the last two years, during which time they have made their home at Rochester.
