He is still waiting, with a close eye on every incoming train. Another powerful machine for dredging, with a special adaptation for removing rocks and other large and heavy substances that cannot be handled by the Bowers dredger, or to pull up piles or to do any other extraordinary job of lifting, besides serve as dredge by the bucket system, if occasion requires, has been added to the harbor improvement appliances now at work. Like the pipe dredger it seems to be just the means needed in performing the work for which it is specially designed, and it was employed to remove a pile of rock, a scow-load of which sank several years ago near the Horro dock and to pull up the piles where a slice is to be taken off that wharf that projects over the waterway. The steamer Caswell, Capt. Parker's new boat, differs materially in some respects from other boats of her class, the result of thought and experience of her owner. She possesses a larger carrying capacity for a boat of her size than any that has ever visited this harbor. The ladies' cabin is on the upper deck and is neatly finished in native woods. The main passenger saloon is on the main deck, where the boilers of other steamers generally take up the greater part of the space. The boiler of the Caswell is a novelty. It is not much larger than a fair-sized range, is of the tubular form and made to withstand a pressure of 250 pounds to the inch. It cannot explode, in the ordinary sense; that is to do much damage to either the boat or the lives of passengers, as should any one of the tubes collapse, it would only result in the escape of a small quantity of steam. Her engines are of long stroke and small bore utilizing to full extent the expansive force of steam. Two Worthington pumps supply the boiler, working independently thus providing a continuous supply of water, although one may clog or fail from any cause to work. The craft is receiving her finishing touches preparatory to official inspection.

**A PLAIN STATEMENT OF FACTS.**

Who is Responsible for the Tempest Created by Rec. and Oly?

**TO THE PUBLIC:** In order that the truth may be known about the late incident at the county jail that has provoked more or less comment, and that all the circumstances may be understood surrounding my alleged "dismissal" by the Sheriff, I wish to make a plain, unvarnished statement. Let it be understood that in so doing I am not desiring to reflect upon anybody, but that in justice to myself and my friends I insist that the truth be known. I will certainly not hurt anybody unless it be some one who ought to be hurt. I did not take anyone to the jail for immoral or other improper purpose. The girl admitted to see Clark on the occasion that caused such a rumpus was admitted on Sheriff McClarty's orders, upon an innocent errand, and Mr. McClarty himself locked her in before she had been there ten minutes. All the talk and cunningly published statements about the Sheriff discharging me has been for mere political effect, and has been a gross injustice to me. I am quite willing to stand the consequences of it at any time do any wrong or make a mistake; but I do object to being made a "scape goat" for the purpose of shielding somebody else.

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
