### DEATH OF A GOOD MAN

SKETCH OF THE LONG CAREER OF EDWIN N. FULLER.

Born in Boston in 1824 he had been identified with Newspaper Work Nearly All His Life—Of Late Years Engaged in Historical Work—Had Gathered Wealth of Interesting Data.

The sudden death of Edwin N. Fuller, the veteran journalist, who died in Tacoma, on Thursday, of last week, will cause a heart-throb of grief from all who knew him.

Mr. Fuller was born in Boston, Mass., in December, 1824, and early engaged in newspaper work, first serving on apprenticeship at the case as a printer, after which he opened in business for himself, establishing several papers in New England, later engaging in editorial work, and still later being prominent in newspaper work in Chicago, Salt Lake City and elsewhere.

Mr. Fuller was married in Boston about forty-six years ago to Miss Augusta E. Morrison, who survives him. In July, 1882, Mr. Fuller first came to Tacoma as editor of the Tacoma Evening News, being one of its first editors, a position which he filled for some time.

For some time after this Mr. Fuller was employed on the Ledger, and then he established a paper in Old Town known as Every Sunday, and later moved this to New Tacoma, continuing its operation for some time.

Of late years Mr. Fuller has devoted his life and energy to the State Historical Society, the offices of which are in the city hall. He was a careful, painstaking writer, enthusiastic in promoting the welfare of Tacoma, kind and courteous, genial, and won a host of friends, while his work for the historical society has been well-nigh invaluable.

After private services in Tacoma, the body was taken to Portland for cremation, in response to the well-known wishes of the deceased.

### THE NEGRO POPULATION.

The Census Bulletin Gives Some Very Interesting Facts.

The census bureau July 1st issued the final bulletin on the negro population of the United States. The number of negroes in the United States, including the entire area covered by the twelfth census (continental United States, Alaska, Hawaii and Porto Rico), is 9,204,531, perhaps a larger number than is found in any other country outside of Africa.

The report indicates that between 11 and 16 per cent. of the negro population are or are believed by the enumerators to have some degree of white blood. The center of the negro population is in Dekalb county, Alabama, about 50 miles from the western boundary having moved thence from Dixie county, Virginia, 76 miles northeast, since 1790.
