The Supreme Court Tuesday approved the finding of the Superior Court of Pierce county, in the case of Larence Whelan vs. the Washington Lumber Co., for \$4,000 damages for personal injuries to defendant's mill.

The marriage of Miss Nina McDonald, only daughter of Dr. J. H. McDonald, took place at Puyallup, on Christmas eve, Albert C. Raymond, a young business man of that city being the happy man.

George H. White, who died at Centralia, Tuesday, was an old-time resident of this city. A third of a century ago he came to this city, to the corner of Columbia and Fourth streets, on the site now occupied by the George store.

The finding in the case of State vs. Strodemier, from Douglas county, was set aside by the Supreme Court, Tuesday, on error, for one of the jurors to separate from the others to take a drink, with the bailiff in presence, in a saloon.
