The bid of the Mills Brothers for the East Bay Avenue improvement has been rejected by the Council, being for \$1,600 more than the estimated cost. A three days' meeting of the Southwestern Washington Development Club is now being held at Hoquiam. It began yesterday and will close to-morrow. C. W. Shaffer, of this city, was re-elected Secretary of the Bar Association held last week at Bellingham, and Arthur Remington, likewise a townie, Treasurer. The local lodge of Foresters were visited by their Chief Ranger, T. J. Cosgrove, of Hartford, Conn., this week, who is on a visit of inspection of the orders in the West. Mrs. Chas. D. King has been called to the bedside of her father residing in Douglas county, who is quite ill. She was accompanied by Mr. King as far as Seattle. Marion, 7-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gerhard Faber, died at the family home on Eastside, yesterday morning, of pneumonia. The funeral will be held to-morrow. J. H. The Capitol Commission has sold about \$12,000 worth from the Capitol lands, the proceeds of which will be applied to payment of the old war debts. A second sale has been ordered for Nov. 15th. Cook has promised to speak on the subject of "Rheumatism in the Social Organism." The City Council Wednesday evening passed the Carlyon fill ordinance and invited bids to be opened on the 17th inst. It embraces 29 blocks on the water front north of Second street and between Water and Jefferson streets, practically the whole tideland district fronting the center of town. The estimated cost is \$102,297.20, payable in ten-year bonds bearing 8 per cent. The assessment is payable in ten yearly instalments; the bonds drawn in denominations of \$100. The prolific yield of wild blackberries, this season, has caused an unusual assault upon the berry patches in the Black Hills and elsewhere, where, whole families making picnic outings of the matter and camping for days. The result has been that some of these sources of supply have been depleted, for this season at least, and it is no wonder. The wild blackberry is the most prized of jarred delicacies. It will keep indefinitely—a can opened a few weeks ago, "put up" four years ago, was put down with a relish equal to that of berries just from the vines. Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Prosecuting Attorney Wilson has been informed by telegram from the Chief of Police of Chalkwalk, Canada, that Ellen White, the 16-year-old daughter of James Little of Little Rock, who disappeared from her home some days ago, with Oscar Duval, a laborer, had been found at Chalkwalk, Duval, it will be remembered, left a wife and two small children, one of which was born two days after his disappearance. A dispatch of Tuesday states that Duval had been apprehended by the mounted police, and Sheriff Gaston left Wednesday evening, via Victoria, to bring the prisoners to Little Rock, where they will be dealt with according to law.

It is now discovered there is a defect in city ordinance No. 1977, in that there is a discrepancy between the title of the enactment and section one thereof. This ordinance relates to proposed improvements in District No. 55, the title states that the improvement on Sixth street shall extend from Plum to Fairview streets, which is in accord with the original resolution adopted in June, 1910, but section one of the ordinance states Sixth street shall be improved between Plum and Central streets, which makes the proceedings nugatory thus far, necessitating correction by a new ordinance to be published the usual length of time. James R. Dever, our efficient City Clerk, thinks he might save the municipality much trouble and expense of original drafts of ordinances were brought to his office two days before the time of sessions of the Council, advising him that in support of a resolution to amend the ordinance for inspection and suggestions of corrections if necessary. But the customary way has been to withhold the drafts of ordinances from his custody till a late hour of the afternoon of the meeting night with a view to giving him the time to do this work, which the City Clerk is not a part of his public duty, but that of the committee having the matter in charge who ought to see the ordinance is in proper shape for submission to the Council. At best there has been too much haste in the resolutions and ordinances and the effects of which may be abundantly realized hereafter. Resolutions of Pomona Grange. The following resolutions need no explanation: July 16, 1910. WHEREAS, In the present Board of County Commissioners two members of the three sitting on the board have, throughout the whole past year, made it a political point of conduct to always oppose the third, and WHEREAS, The two members of this combine never deem it wise to interfere with each other in questions belonging to the road districts which they represent, and in this manner have brought about a complete control and power over the county road districts; now therefore Resolved, That Thurston County Pomona Grange does not approve of political combines in the work of our County Commissioners, all three of whom were elected by the entire suffrage of the county to do the work of their offices in an impartial manner. CHRISTOPHER Columbus Wilson and seven other officers of the United Wireless company, charged with conspiracy to defraud by using the U. S. mails and to sell worthless stocks have been indicted by the Federal Grand Jury on two counts, one charging conspiracy by use of the mails and another conspiracy to defraud investors. Wilson is held in \$25,000 bail, and others for less amounts. The company is said to have outstanding stock (nominally \$20,000,000 worth of common and preferred) but it is charged that very little of the payments therefor have gone into the "pot," all having been absorbed by these officers, like Jo. "Why Don't They Rule?" The Commoner begins this week publication of the replies written by Commoners-readers to Senator Owens' Work of Equalization. The County Commissioners have been sitting as a board of equalization this week. A general raise has been agreed upon of timberland values, which will be assessed at 25 per cent of their true value. The greatest raise was made in the assessment of the Pacific Telegraph & Telephone company whose property was listed at \$19,600 and raised by the board to \$25,905. Other raises are as follows: Rabcock, \$2,800 to \$3,000; J. J. Winslow, pool room, \$615 to \$895; W. A. Webber, \$965 to \$1,055; Womans club, \$210 to \$400; A. J. Weston, \$2,960 to \$3,450; H. N. Stickler, \$3,125; A. L. Krider, \$1,280 to \$1,415; St. O'Connor, \$2,175 to \$3,000; Farmington, \$1,200 to \$1,250; W. H. Maynard, \$1,075 to \$1,250. Real and personal property of the county of Thurston total \$8,725,141, according to the figures turned over to the board of equalization by Assessors Bennett and O'Brien. The total of personal property for county and incorporated towns is \$2,189,597, with \$528,912 exemptions leaving a balance for assessment purposes of \$1,660,685. Real estate totals for the entire county, \$7,074,456, with a total of real and personal of \$8,725,141. Last year the personal property assessed \$2,078,652, with \$534,870 exemptions leaving a balance of \$1,543,782. The real estate last year totaled \$6,382,531; the grand total being \$8,226,313. The gain for this year is \$208,828, mostly from the timberlands. In the personal property lists, outside property shows a valuation of \$1,214,452, with the taxation \$929,737. Olympia, total \$808,613; exemption, \$208,503; assessed \$600,110. Tumwater, total \$108,620; exemption \$14,214; assessed \$94,406. Tenino, total \$57,912; exemptions, \$21,480; assessed \$36,432. The recapitulation of the real estate rolls shows: Outside—Land values \$4,546,552; improvements \$423,425; total \$4,971,977. Olympia—Land values, \$998,894; improvements, \$814,645; total, \$1,813,539. Tumwater—Land value, \$45,805; improvements \$130,201; total, \$176,006.
