Loomis, a merchant at Little Rock, were married in this city, Tuesday; Gordon Billings intends to leave today for Fairbault, Minn., to attend the Shattuck Military academy; Prof. Aikin, a graduate of the State College at Pullman, will have charge of Olympia high school this year; Mrs. A. L. Kreider left Sunday for a visit to her daughter, Mrs. A. F. Biner, who resides in Phoenix, B. C.; Charley Henry, who returned from a surveying trip in Lewis county, recently, left Wednesday for Raymond; The dredger Tacoma commenced, Wednesday, slinging mud on the Eastside fill, another "Tacoma-made" product; Frank Howard, of Raymond, and Miss Hildos Forsman, of South Saturday; Miss Philippine Schmidt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leopold Schmidt, has gone to Portland to enter St. Helen's Hall; A jury term of the Superior Court is this year set for November instead of September, the regular time for that term; The Supreme Court has declared unconstitutional the law of 1909 eliminating insanity as a defense in criminal prosecutions; The dredger Tacoma has been towed to the Eastside waterway in order to get ready for the big fill of the Moxlie Creek slough; Miss Dora Nonnensen left Wednesday for Franklin on an indefinite visit with a view of recovering from a disagreeable attack of hay fever; The Washington State Fair that meets at North Yakima from Sept. 20th to Oct. 1st inclusive, has set apart Sept. 24th for Woman's Day; Donald Barry, aged three years, died at the home of his parents on Friday of last week, of what was pronounced cerebro-spinal meningitis; And now Judge Robinson and F. W. Hays are still fighting the celebrated Sullivan case for the costs accorded Marie Corrau, claiming the estate; Dr. Carlyon and A. W. Local news snippets including: Ludwig Larson, the Tenino rancher, was fined \$25 and costs, amounting to all he had, for not knowing that he had to have a permit from a fire warden to burn a slash; Tom Giddings, a well-known rancher, was thrown from his buggy when his team took fright Monday, sustaining a severe fracture of his skull, which it is feared may prove fatal; James I. Seward and wife returned to Olympia last Sunday after an absence of six weeks in Idaho, near Richville. Mr. Seward while absent perfected his title to 169 acres, under the arid land laws; It is said that a new transportation company has been organized with Millard Lennon, R. D. McDonald, F. V. C. Young and P. M. Troy of this city, and E. H. Prosser of Tacoma as incorporators; James M. Hutchings, the horticulturist, has purchased a small tract of land near Eima, on which he is erecting a dwelling-house. Mr. H. has not as yet determined whether he will move to Chehalis county; Mrs. Mary G. Parsons, who settled on Chambers Prairie with her husband 32 years ago, died on the 8th inst., and was buried on Sunday afternoon. She is survived by two daughters, both of whom are married; W. P. Taylor, formerly employed in the State Highway Commissioners' Office, has been appointed Accountant in the office of the State Board of Control, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of J. B. James; The Board of Directors of the Y. M. C. A. have secured the services of R. C. Horn to act as Secretary permanently and F. H. Gawley for Physical Director. So the business side of the Y. M. C. A. will be well cared for by these gentlemen; George H. Funk has successfully contested the raise of the board of equalization increasing the assessment of the Funk-Volland building from \$6,000 to \$8,000. The judgment of the court was filed on the plea that the owners had not been given the legal five days' notice of the proposed increase; J. A. Hoshier, Tuesday, was nominated by the Thurston County Prohibition party as its candidate for Prosecuting Attorney. Squire Giggie, of Little Rock, seems to be his chief push. It is reported Mr. Hoshier will make a personal and house-to-house canvass of the county during the coming campaign; Chester Rutledge, son of Mrs. Belle Rutledge of Little Rock, met death instantly Monday afternoon, being crushed by a rolling log while at work in a logging camp near Aberdeen. The funeral rites were held from the Methodist church in this city Wednesday afternoon, and interment made in Odd Fellows cemetery; Fraternal Union of America held a special meeting at the home of Mrs. C. J. Swayne on East Fifth street, this week, for the purpose of completing their plans towards running a referendum at the Southwestern Washington Fair, to be held between Centralia and Chehalis, for which they are going to compete for the \$100 prize; The ancient controversy entitled Wipple vs. Lee, Jas. I. Murray intervenor, was up again before Judge Mitchell, Tuesday. It seems Murray has the case about which the litigation centers. Assuming the whole law in a case is represented by ten points, an old lawyer has wisely remarked possession represents nine of the number; The new form of money order is now in use at our local office. It is now the site of the Dupont Powder Co. Six sons and one daughter survive; Messrs. S. H. Brown and John Goldsby, of Delphi, were in the city Tuesday. They are Socialists and are somewhat at sea on the present political situation, as the party with which they affiliate has no ticket in the field. It has been reported by some of the local Socialists there is a prospect of a State and Congressional ticket being placed in the field between now and the November election; The proposed union fair for this and Mason counties at the Carlson Driving Park, this fall, has been abandoned, on account of the lateness of the season, but in its stead is proposed the holding of an exhibit of "Made-in-Olympia" articles and farm products of this county in some down-town store-room, of which suggestion the Commercial Club and Chamber of Commerce will have in charge; George Langridge was in town Tuesday, rejoicing over the election news from Maine, remarked the Payne-Aldrich tariff law is not proving to be a good vote-getter. The spirit of Democracy is abroad and there is a pronounced revolt against class law and special privilege. The doom of centralization is not written in ambiguous language and there are many Daniels to interpret the signs of the times; Did Lawyer Fry know what he was talking about when he predicted on his return from Missouri that Roosevelt had been instrumental in splitting the G. Some More of the Commissioners' Dirty Work. Another of those glaring mis-statements for which the Perkins Estate are so remarkable appears in yesterday's Olympian in which it is said that Bertelsen & Sons of Tacoma, have begun suit against the county for the cost of constructing an approach to the new bridge built jointly with Pierce county. The statement of claim, we are informed by the President of the Board of Commissioners, is untrue; that it is for no part of the approach proper to the steel bridge at Sherlock, and Bertelsen was so informed before he began work on it and that the law provides that such improvements aggregating a cost of more than \$200, shall be subject to competition by bid and guaranty by bond. This bridge is to cover a slough and the bill for it amounting to \$915 was presented to the commissioners and allowed by Raymond and Van Eaton. Despite the fact that the claim was palpably illegal, from its nature, cost and want of bond. The Auditor has very properly refused, under these circumstances to audit and allow the bill, and Bertelsen has asked that a writ of mandate be issued to compel payment. This is not the first time these easy-going Commissioners have consented to override the law, under the convenient avowal of public necessity. It is hardly probable that they may use the court to patch up what they assume to be a willful neglect to state the exact truth.
