Instructed county engineer to inspect conditions at the Prather bridge, where a new structure is now being erected, to determine whether it is necessary to establish a ferry to accommodate the farmers of that district until the new bridge is finished.

The commissioners have adopted a preliminary resolution calling for the improvement of a 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ -mile stretch of the Pacific highway from Tumwater south across Bush prairie, known as permanent highway No. 5, and for the improvement of the Pacific highway beginning at a point just west of Lacey and running to the west end of state aid road No. 39, a short distance east of Lacey, to be known as permanent highway No. 2A.

#### AROUND THE COUNTY

Thurston county potatoes displayed at the recent state fair brought forth much favorable comment from Charles B. Hannovan of the dining car department of the Northern Pacific railway, who pronounced them "the best spuds I ever saw," and has resulted in an inquiry as to whether the farmers of the county can supply his road. Potatoes weighing a pound and a half each or more and sound in every respect, are desired by the company, for which it is willing to pay as high as \$25 a ton. Mr. Hannovan's letter states he will make a personal trip to some of the farms of this county, if such large potatoes were raised in sufficient quantities here last year, and the Chamber of Commerce suggests that farmers who may be interested communicate with it or with Mr. Hannovan, whose offices are in Spokane. Few potatoes raised in this county bring \$25 a ton—here's a chance for somebody to get busy.

Some \$300 in stamps and \$100 in cash were taken from the Yelm post office early Saturday morning by a burglar or burglars who are thought to have used nitro-glycerine in blowing the post office safe, located in the D. H. Hughes general store.
