PLAN ANOTHER COLONY.

1,000,000 Acres in This Section May Instantly Be Settled by Dutch.

Announcement was made in Chehalis during the last week that I. V. Van Zanten, a native of Holland, plans the ultimate colonization of 1,000,000 acres of logged-over lands in Southwest Washington and Western Oregon, proposing to settle 1,200 acres the first year, 4,000 acres the second, 32,000 the third, and so on, with a 40-acre limit to each settler. The announcement stated that he had been conferring with N. B. Coffman of that city, president of the Southwest Washington Settlers' agency.

Mr. VanZanten proposes to secure on long time thousands of acres of logged-off lands in the sections named for use in settling colonies of Hollanders. Mr. Van Zanten is a retired merchant and a man of considerable wealth. He has visited different portions of the United States and Canada, where immigration and colonization plans are being exploited and has satisfied himself fully that this section of the Pacific Northwest is better suited to his purpose than any other.

XMAS SEALS READY.

Little Red Cross Emblems Will Be Placed on Sale December 1.

Once more the people of Washington have the opportunity to join with the world forces that fight tuberculosis with the proceeds of the Red Cross seals, for the Washington Association for the Prevention and Relief of Tuberculosis needs 1,000 local volunteer managers in various parts of the state to take charge of the seal sale from December 1 to Christmas eve.

No locality is too small to be represented. Only one manager is appointed in each community. Women's clubs, schools, library boards and individuals served last year with great success. Every one can help in this great national campaign which annually furnishes funds for the tuberculosis work.

Consider what has been accomplished in this state alone as a result of the past three years' campaign of education and organization, a campaign which would have been impossible without the funds derived from the Red Cross seals. THE CONCRETE SILO.

Coat of Tar and Gasoline Makes It Air-Tight—Protects Concrete.

The field men of the dairy farming investigation of the United States department of agriculture recently have been giving careful attention to methods of improving concrete silos so as to prevent the drying out of silage near the walls and to protect the concrete from the action of silage juice.

They find that the concrete silo has given universal satisfaction among the farmers provided it is properly built, of good material, well re-enforced and set on a good foundation. The walls, however, as ordinarily built, are porous, and silage near the walls of the silo is apt to dry unless the inside of the silo is given a coating of some material that will fill the pores in the concrete. In the case of a large number of concrete silos in the South and West the field agents of the division applied with a brush an inside coat of raw coal tar thinned with gasoline. This coat made the silos air tight and also protected the concrete from the action of the silage juice.

\$25,000 to Advertise Washington. (La Crosse Clipper.)

The \$25,000 appropriated by our freak legislature last winter at Olympia to advertise the state of Washington became available some time ago and we have been wondering what use this money would be put to when the question is answered in the form of a letter received from a Seattle advertising agency containing copy for the paper. This letter clears up the ground and places the question up to the newspaper men in the proper way. Twenty-five thousand dollars were appropriated to advertise the opportuni-

ties of this state in order to secure desirable settlers. The money was not appropriated to be given to a gang of grafters who secure their pay upon the strength of being able to work the newspaper men for free space. If this money was to be spent in advertising the resources of this state, give it to the men who work and earn it. The newspaper man that publishes free this Howell press dope is too great a simpton to be classed as a publisher.

William Meyer's plan for the organization of a big German club in Olympia which it is expected will number more than 100 members when fully under way, took definite form last week when a dozen local Germans in a preliminary meeting elected A. A. Gottfeld president, H. Schaeff secretary and William Meyer treasurer of the Olympia Deutscher Verein. The organization was completed at a second meeting last Wednesday night, when a constitution and by-laws will be adopted. One of the main features of the club is the formation of a "Saengerbund," or singing society, while another will be an athletic branch and the club has already engaged Prof. Herman of Tacoma, a well known teacher of music and leader of German organizations, to instruct the local Saengerbund every Thursday evening. If the plans of its promoters work out, the Deutscher Verein will number among its members some of the most prominent men of the city and will also be one of its largest and most influential organizations.

G. D. Meeker, who sustained an injury to one eye while working at a local lumber mill, won his suit against the industrial insurance commission in the local superior court last week so far as establishing the fact that he was regularly employed at the time of the accident, the court ruling that the jury could not determine the amount of the damages because of the compensation law, though Meeker had sued for \$1,500. Meeker must now present his claim to the industrial insurance commission again.
