TENINO

A new bank is to be opened in Tenino within two or three weeks. J. J. The business of the new bank will be controlled by a board of five directors, who will be elected by the stockholders and who will pass on all loans. Mr. Roberts, who is a brother of J. H. Roberts, a prominent Centralia realty dealer and chairman of the Lewis County Democratic Central Committee, comes highly recommended by

the bank of which he has had charge as cashier for the past five years. He had been dickering for the purchase of the Tenino State bank before that institution closed its doors recently. Committees have been appointed and are already busy with the arrangements for the annual Christmas dance of the Tenino Odd Fellows. A supper will be served in connection with the event this year.
