ORDINANCE NO. 1357.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO A. C. Stevens, His Successors and Assigns, the Right of Using a Portion of Pine Street and East Bay Avenue for the Purpose of Laying a Private Water Pipe Therein. The City Council of the City of Olympia do ordain as follows: Section 1. That A. C. Stevens, his successors and assigns, are hereby granted the right and privilege of laying a private water pipe along Pine street to its intersection with East Bay avenue, and thence along East Bay avenue to the property of the said A. C. Stevens. Section 2. That the said water pipe is for the purpose of conveying water to the premises of the said A. C. Stevens for his private use, and that in digging in the said Pine street and East Bay avenue there shall be exercised no undue traffic on said streets as far as possible, and the pipe shall be laid in such portion of the said streets as shall be published and accepted by the City Engineer. Said grantee shall at all times, when entering upon said streets for the purpose of repairing the said pipe, or for any other purpose, leave said streets in as good condition as it was when he so entered upon the said streets, and shall refill any holes or trenches excavated in the said streets, and the City Commissioner. Also grantee specifically agrees that if at any time said pipe interferes with the use of said streets he will remove the same within ten days notice from the City Council. Section 3. That no open trenches shall be left, and that the streets shall be left in as good condition as they now are, after the pipe has been put in; also, the said A. C. Stevens shall hold the said streets free from injury or damage whatsoever caused by reason of entering upon the said Pine street and East Bay avenue for the purpose above stated. Section 4. That the said A. C. Stevens shall accept the provisions of this grant in writing within ten days after its publication, and file the same with the City Engineer before he shall so enter upon the said streets. AN ORDINANCE APPROVING AND Confirming the Assessment and Assessment Roll of Local Improvement District No. 166, for the Improvement of the Following Named Streets: Between the Points Named, by Constructing Wooden Walks Thereon, Including Curbs, Gutters, and Sidewalks, and Levying and Assessing the Amounts Thereof Against the Several Lots, Tracts, Parcels of Land and Other Property of the City of Olympia, to Roll, and Establishing a Local Improvement Fund, to-wit: Pacific street from Park street to Union street on the east side thereof, and from Pacific street to Union street on both sides thereof, from Swan street to Fremont street on the west side thereof; Swan street from Jefferson street to Plum street on the north side thereof; Fremont street from Jefferson street to Plum street on both sides thereof; Davis street from Jefferson street to Chestnut street on the south side thereof; Pacific street from Cherry street to Chestnut street on both sides thereof; Dayton street from Jefferson street to Chestnut street on the south side thereof; Lincoln street from Jefferson street to Chestnut street on the south side thereof, to be four (4) feet in width; Jefferson street from Union street to Eighteenth street on both sides thereof; Chestnut street from Dayton street to Fremont street on the east side thereof; Fremont street to Pacific street on the west thereof; Eleventh street from Adams street to Jefferson street on both sides thereof; Twelfth street from Adams street to Jefferson street on the south side thereof; Thirteenth street from Adams street to Jefferson street on the south side thereof; Fourteenth street from Adams street to Jefferson street on both sides thereof. The City Council of the City of Olympia do ordain as follows: Section 1. That the assessment and assessment roll of Local Improvement District No. 166, for the improvement of the streets named in this ordinance, on the east side thereof, and from Pacific street to Union street on both sides thereof, from Swan street to Fremont street on the west side thereof; Swan street from Jefferson street to Plum street on the north side thereof; Fremont street from Jefferson street to Plum street on both sides thereof; Davis street from Jefferson street to Chestnut street on the south side thereof; Pacific street from Cherry street to Chestnut street on both sides thereof; Dayton street from Jefferson street to Chestnut street on the south side thereof; Lincoln street from Jefferson street to Chestnut street on the south side thereof, be and the same is hereby approved and confirmed. Section 2. Of the lots, tracts, parcels of land and other property shown upon said roll is hereby declared to be especially benefited by said improvement, and that the amount charged against the same and that the assessment appearing against the same in proportion to the several lots and parcels shown upon said roll, there is hereby levied and assessed against each such lot, tract, parcel of land and other property shown upon said roll, the amount finally charged against the same thereon. Section 3. For the purpose of this im-

ORDINANCE NO. 1359.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE Employment of Labor on Local or Public Improvements. The City Council of the City of Olympia do ordain as follows: Section 1. That in all contracts let by the City of Olympia for the improvement of any work upon the public streets of the City of Olympia, the contractor to employ at least eighty per cent of bona-fide home labor, and by bona-fide home labor is meant men who have resided in the City of Olympia at least three months prior to the letting of said contract. Provided: That at the event that satisfactory home labor cannot be secured a lesser amount of home labor may be so employed. Section 2. That said contract shall also contain a provision requiring said contractor to pay each laborer employed, whether he be a laborer residing in the City of Olympia or not, at least the sum of \$2.50 per eight-hour day, and the City Engineer in estimating the expense of local or public improvements shall use this same as a basis for the computation of the expense of the labor. Section 3. That said contracts shall further provide that failure to comply with either of the provisions above specified shall subject the contractor to a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each and every day that he fails to comply with the amount of the contract price paid into the general or current expense fund of the City of Olympia. The Board on motion granted the following petitions for the correction of taxes: Petition of Arthur E. Modes for all cancellation of real estate assessment of 1914 personal property taxes. Petition of J. B. Haskin for statutory exemption and cancellation of taxes. Petition of John Stillwell for statutory exemption and cancellation of personal property taxes. Petition of J. L. Peters, by Assessor, for cancellation of real estate assessment as shown in Roll 6, page 13, line 38, land in Bigelow, D. C., erroneously assessed, and the supplemental assessment of the same in proper school district.

On motion of Mr. Dodge the chairman was authorized to pay the fare of John Carmichael from Olympia to Moshon and file his claim for the amount advanced. Bond of Walter Crosby as Justice of the Peace for Olympia precinct, on motion was approved and ordered filed. Claim of the Burroughs Adding Machine Company for \$404.25 for adding machine purchased for the Auditor's office, on motion was approved and ordered paid out of the current expense fund. The Board entered into a hearing on the petition of Wm. Dale and Ed Freeman for the vacation of blocks 21, 22, 23 and 24, of Ruby's Pacific Addition, together with Hickory street and Pear street, unnamed streets surrounding said blocks on the north and west, and lots in said blocks, and it appearing to the Board that said streets are not required as a part of the public road system, and there being no protests filed against said vacation, the Board on motion granted said petition and passed an order approving report of Treasurer for month of February. Emergency clause only of the bill giving the state bank examiner instead of the court jurisdiction over a defunct bank, subject to court review. To repeal present law authorizing use of convict labor on public roads. Section 6 of state budget bill, providing penalty of \$10 for officials failing to file budgets on time.
