
Northern State Hospital

(Second of a series of twelve articles on the various state institutions.)

In his report at the end of the biennium, September 30, 1908, Dr. A. P. Calhoun, superintendent of the Western hospital at Fort Steilacoom, recommended that the legislature of 1909 provide for another hospital for the insane in some good farming district, so that he could transfer a portion of his patients who would be benefited by outdoor employment. He stated that the crowded condition at Fort Steilacoom made it absolutely necessary that some provision be made to care for the great increase which would occur during the next biennium. He stated that it would not necessarily have to have a complete corps of officials at first, but if an appropriation could be secured sufficient to purchase some good land and erect temporary buildings, that it would be a starter, and that the permanent buildings could be erected in time.

The legislature therefore passed an act requiring the governor to appoint three qualified electors, who, with the superintendent of the Western state hospital and the members

of the board of control, would form a commission to acquire for the use of the state a fertile, tillable tract of land of not less than 320 acres suitable for diversified farming and to be located in Skagit county if suitable land could be found there.

After the organization of this commission they were instructed to examine and select a proper site and to acquire the same by purchase or otherwise. After the tract of land was secured the duties of the commission were to cease, and the management of the farm was to devolve upon the board of control, and the superintendent of the Western state hospital was made superintendent of the farm.

The board was ordered to construct the necessary buildings on the farm and to acquire the necessary machinery, and they were to appoint an assistant superintendent and such other help as would be needful to properly take care of the patients and to take care of and manage the farm.

When the buildings were completed the superintendent was instructed to remove thereto such patients in the Western state hospital who were physically able to perform manual labor and otherwise fitted to be kept on such a farm, and that, from time to time as warranted, he could remove other patients.

Located at Sedro-Woolley.

Seventy-five thousand dollars was appropriated for the purchase of the land and for the erection and equipment of the temporary buildings, and it was primarily designated the Sedro-Woolley insane farm by the board after the site had been selected near that city. The site is a magnificent one, and contains enough fuel to supply the needs of the institution for many years to come.

The southern part of the estate is low ground, of which considerable is timbered, and the upper part rises gradually to an elevation approximately 135 feet above the low lands. There is a stream of water flowing through the property, augmented by three smaller streams. Approximately 75 per cent of the entire area can be irrigated from the streams on the property.

Temporary buildings were erected of sufficient size for the housing of about 100 patients, together with the necessary number of attendants and employes. A cottage, purchased with the land, was remodeled and enlarged for the accommodation of the super-

intendent and family. A concrete septic tank was built with 250 feet of 4-inch tiling, leading from the buildings to the tank, and a 4-inch wooden outlet pipe from the tank to a gravel filter bed 1,250 feet distant. The land was surveyed and a survey made for a topographical map, electric power plant and gravity water system.

The 1911 legislature made an appropriation of \$385,000 for the purchase of more land, for maintenance and for the building of modern fire-proof buildings, for what the board had informally named the Northern state hospital. They recommended that the state erect nothing but fire-proof buildings and that they be built on the colony plan. It was not until the 1915 session of the legislature that the name of the hospital was established as the Northern state hospital, and that it was made a separate receiving hospital.

Territory Served by Hospital.

The law establishing the hospital stated that persons found to be insane by the superior courts of Clallam, Island, Jefferson, King, Kitsap, San Juan, Skagit, Snohomish and Whatcom counties should be committed to the Northern state hospital, provided that if it shall be made to appear to the satisfaction of the judge ordering the commitment, upon the application of the relatives or friends of the insane person or by the recommendation of the examining physician, that by reason of climatic conditions or the nature of the insanity of such person it would be to his interest to be committed to another hospital, and that such other hospital has room and accommodations for receiving and caring for such person, the judge may commit such person to one of the other hospitals, and provided further that whenever the state board of control shall certify to the superior court of any county that the hospital above specified to receive insane persons committed from that county is for the time being unable to care for additional patients and shall designate one of the other hospitals, the judge of such court shall, until further advised by the state board of control, commit patients to other hospitals; and, provided further, that nothing shall prevent the state board of control, upon the recommendation of the superintendent of any hospital, transferring a patient in such hospital to another hospital, when it shall appear that the interest of the state or of such patient demands such transfer.

The institution started out with 100 patients transferred to it from the hospital at Fort Steilacoom. During the first year seven vacancies were created, two patients were discharged as recovered, three died and two escaped. Twelve additional patients were received from the Western hospital in 1912, all the patients up to this time being male. All were employed at outdoor work, and all gained in health and strength.

A railroad spur from the Northern Pacific railroad gives the institution fine railroad facilities. The Northern Pacific makes the institution terminal rates, the same as at Sedro-Woolley, with no switching charges to put cars on the spur. The railroad destination is known as "Nolum."

The first permanent improvement was the construction of the water system, consisting of a primary reservoir of 20,000 gallons capacity and secondary reservoir of about 800,000 gallons capacity. These two reservoirs are connected with a 20-inch pipe line. An administration building
