OFFUT LAKE PEOPLE TO SUE COUNTY FOR SCHOOL

Commissioners Refuse to Re-Consider Decision Against New District.

Suit to compel the formation of a new school district in the Offut lake neighborhood and the construction of a school there for the benefit of the 18 children of that section, will be filed against the county commissioners...

This was the latest development in the controversy that has been going on for some months between the residents of Offut lake and Plum Station, now one district. The first racket started when the directors refused to put on a wagon to haul the Offut lake children to the school at Plum Station.

After a public hearing, County Superintendent Goss authorized a new district at Offut lake, making it up from portions of the Plum Station and Spurgeon creek districts. Then the Plum Station people appealed from Goss' ruling to the county commissioners...

This week the commissioners refused to re-consider their decision, and intention to bring suit was announced.

SUBMARINE GETS AWAY

Deutschland Passes Virginia Capes Apparently Unobserved.

The German submarine merchantman Deutschland passed quietly out of the Virginia capes Wednesday night on her homeward voyage, apparently unobserved by the allied warship patrol waiting outside the three-mile limit.

Her departure to sea followed an 18-mile dash through the lower Chesapeake bay. After proceeding slowly most of the way down, she increased her power and reached the capes just after dusk.

Whether she submerged before reaching the three-mile limit is not known. The two accompanying boats only know that she disappeared unharmed, and that to all appearances she had a clear field ahead to a point where she could completely submerge, in safety.

COMMISSIONERS DODGE FARM EXPERT HEARING

Inspect Little Rock Bridge Instead—Will Try Again August 14.

After voluntarily fixing last Tuesday afternoon as the date for a public hearing on the question of re-employing a farm agent in this county and issuing a general invitation to farmers from all parts of the county to attend, Thurston county's commissioners went to Little Rock shortly before 2 o'clock that afternoon, to inspect a bridge or do something else of the kind, the farmers who had gathered at the courthouse went home disgusted, and R. B. Coglon, the state supervisor, left the city on the 3 o'clock train.

Quite a number of farmers were at the courthouse at the time set for the hearing, and more were in the city, but the word quickly spread around that the commissioners had gone to Little Rock, and after waiting around for an hour or so for the commissioners to return, the farmers went back to their homes.

Director Coglon announced, before leaving Olympia, that he would return to the city in a couple of weeks and would try to arrange for a public hearing before the commissioners Monday, August 14. The commissioners have since announced themselves as favoring the re-establishment of the farm agent system and as desiring a conference with Mr. Coglon.

Blumauer Withdraws From Race.

Stating that he had received a very attractive offer to become manager of a large mercantile firm in the mining district of Eastern Oregon, near Baker City, Isaac Blumauer this week announced his withdrawal as a candidate for the Republican nomination as county assessor.

Plan Fair at Tenino.

Tenino is to have a fair this year, says the Journal, which adds that plans for the continuation of a fair association for Tenino are maturing and it is expected that by September a permanent building for a place in which to hold agricultural exhibits will be erected.

In the meantime Roberts has the distinction of being a cash prisoner, and Marshal Ton, of Brighton, of being one peace officer who does his reward work on a strictly "C. O. D." basis.

The authorities at Key West made the arrest on telegraphic orders and there is a question as to whether or not they are entitled to the money.

HUGHES TO VISIT COAST.

Republican Candidate to Speak in Tacoma and Seattle August 15.

Charles E. Hughes, the Republican nominee for president, is scheduled to address a day meeting at Tacoma and an evening meeting at Seattle August 15, according to an announcement made this week from his New York headquarters.

At New York Monday night Mr. Hughes, in his formal speech accepting the Republican nomination, outlined the issues upon which he will conduct his campaign for the presidency. His speech consisted of a general arraignment of the Wilson administration, assailing particularly the president's Mexican policy.

LALLY IS CANDIDATE

Spokane Man Wants to Be Lister's Running Mate This Fall.

SPOKANE, Wash., August 4.—Thomas Lally of Spokane, who recently announced his candidacy for lieutenant governor on the Democratic ticket, has the united support of Spokane and Eastern Washington Democrats, who are urging his nomination on the ground that that part of the state should be allowed to name the running mate for Governor Lister, who, as a former resident of Tacoma, is credited to the West Side.

Mr. Lally, who is an attorney and also vice president of the New World Life Insurance company of Spokane, will make an aggressive campaign, and expects to tour the entire state in an automobile in behalf of the state and national ticket. During the past week he visited the West Side, making addresses at Tacoma, Puyallup, Seattle and Everett.

Lally, wherever he has appeared, has made an excellent impression. He is a fine speaker, with a forceful personality, and is going into this campaign with the determination of not only winning the nomination but also defeating his Republican opponent in the November election.
