NEW FORD AGENCY ESTABLISHED HERE

CENTRALIA FIRM CONTRACTS FOR 707 CARS FOR THURSTON AND LEWIS COUNTIES.

St. John & Titus of Centralia, the new agents for Ford cars in Thurston and Lewis counties, this week announced that J. D. Mansfield, formerly of Centralia, will be manager of the local branch, and Burton Troxell in charge of sales. Coupled with this came the announcement that they had contracted with A. H. Christopher for the construction of a one-story concrete building, 60 by 100 feet in size, at 522-24 East Fourth street, the work on which is to be started immediately.

The entire front of the new building will consist of plate glass show windows, and in the fore part of the building will be located the office, ladies' rest room, and cabinets for machine parts. A balcony will occupy a portion of this section of the room, to be used for storage, and the whole interior will be finished in a bungalow design.

Other Features of Building. A solid wall will separate the front of the building from the garage in the rear, and the workshop will be located behind the garage. The street alongside the building will also be paved, and oil and gasoline service stations installed there.

Along with the change in the local agency and the reduction in the price of Fords, comes the announcement that changes making for an improved appearance in the machines are to be noted in the new models, the first carload of which are expected here September 1. The hood and fenders of the car have been remodeled, giving them more sweeping lines.

St. John & Titus have been Lewis county agents for Ford cars since 1910, maintaining salesrooms, service stations and garages in Centralia and Chehalis. The greatly increased territory which the firm will serve under its new contract requires the establishment of service stations and machine shops in this city, Tenino and Morton. Olympia will serve all of the central and western part of Thurston county, while Tenino will take care of the eastern part.

The southeastern part of Thurston county, the Oakville section and the northern part of Lewis county will be served from Centralia, while Morton will take care of the extreme eastern end of Lewis county, leaving all of western and southern Lewis county to Chehalis. In these five stations \$12,000 worth of Ford parts will be carried in stock at all times. This will guarantee that any part for any Ford car can be obtained at any one of these stations at any time.

The firm's business has enjoyed a remarkable increase since it first took the Ford agency for Lewis county in 1910, and contracted for 10 cars that year. The second year the number jumped to 40. In 1915 it had increased to 175. For the year ended August 1, 1916, the company contracted for 225 Fords for Lewis county and sold 257. The 1917 contract calls for the 707 cars, to be distributed as follows: Chehalis, 262; Centralia, 160; Olympia, 200; Tenino, 45; Morton, 40.

The company expects to employ 20 men here when fully established.
