URGES USE OF TRACTORS

Local Agent Says Machines Would Be Big Help to Farmers.

The campaign for increased food production and the shortage of labor, which it is expected will become acute at harvest time, combine to make the farm tractor an advisable and necessary investment for the farmer, enabling him to do considerably more work at a less operating expense, according to E. Nepple of the Rose-Nepple Auto company, local agents for the "Big Bull" tractor, now being actively introduced in this territory with the assistance of Geo. F. Kendal of the Northwest Butch company of Seattle.

"The tractor can do the work of three or four teams in plowing, for example," Nepple says, "and do it more speedily, and it takes only one man to operate it. Furthermore, it can be run day and night, and that is what farmers in the wheat fields of Eastern Washington are doing, using searchlights at night."

J. A. Donnelly of Chambers Prairie owns a Big Bull tractor, and, according to Mr. Nepple, recently plowed an 80-acre tract at a cost of 32 cents per acre for distillate and oil. Besides doing plowing, the machine can be used for all sorts of farm work and is especially useful at harvest time, the agents say. The Big Bull burns gasoline, distillate or kerosene.
