MACY SCALE STANDS UNTIL NEW AWARD

GOVERNMENT GUARANTEES THE PRESENT BASIS UNTIL AGREEMENT.

The Macy board award relating to wages, hours and other conditions, which expired last Monday night, was continued and guaranteed until the employees and employers of all shipyards in the country where the award applies have reached a new agreement, by an announcement made last Saturday by Charles Piez, director-general of the Emergency Fleet Corporation.

The guarantee, Mr. Piez said, would expire October 1, if an agreement has not been reached by that time. Mr. Piez made the announcement after a conference with representatives of labor unions and private yards. Notices to all the yards were sent out Mr. Piez said.

A plan to take the place of the Macy board award is under consideration by employers and employees, Mr. Piez said, and he hopes that by the end of this week agreements will be reached. It is planned, he added, to have three district boards, one covering the Pacific coast, another the Great Lakes and the third the Atlantic seaboard. There would be five representatives of employers and five representing labor on each of the three boards. The plan of operation would be along the general lines of the Macy award. The fleet corporation would not be represented on the new boards.

APPROVES SALE OF 5,000 SACKS OF SEED OYSTERS

Price of \$2 Per Sack Placed by State On Product of Oakland Bay Reserve.

Sale by the state of 5,000 sacks of seed oysters at \$2 a sack was authorized at a meeting of the state fish commission this week. The seed particularly specified for this sale will come from the Oakland bay reserve, in Mason county, either in the last of April or early in May, according to favoring tides. The state fisheries department will take up the oysters and load them on scows to be furnished by buyers, the latter to attend to distribution.

Sale of additional seed oysters from the Clifton reserve in Mason county is also authorized at discretion of the commission, leaving details to be arranged later. Commissioner L. H. Darwin estimates that not more than 1,000 sacks will be available from Clifton. The price from this reserve is left to be fixed on the opening day, probably at \$1.50 a sack, the difference in price being due to less favorable conditions.

It is probable also that seed oysters will be sold this spring from the Oyster bay reserve, on preliminary estimates of from 500 to 1,000 sacks, as the first definite return from work done on diking and improving state

beds the state fisheries department will have double the quantity of seed oysters to sell this year than have ever before been available from improved beds.
