**ISSUES WARNING TO
LAND PURCHASERS**

STATE RECLAMATION BOARD IS
COMBATting SMOOTH TALK
OF DEALERS.

"Wildcatting" prospects in unimproved arid, swamp and logged-off lands on representations that these are certain to be improved under the state reclamation act have already become so apparent that the state reclamation board is officially taking steps to prevent as far as possible any swindling of people actually desiring farm lands by irresponsible speculators.

Through Commissioner Clark V. Savidge, secretary, the state reclamation board has issued the following "wildcat" warning:

"The state reclamation board, authorized under the state reclamation act passed by the last legislature, desires to warn the public against investing in lands which are alleged to come under one of the state reclamation projects contemplated under the provisions of Chapter 153 of the session laws of 1919.

"Do not buy until you have satisfied yourself of the character of the investigation being made.

"The mere fact that the board may be investigating any one of several proposed projects does not guarantee that development of the project will be undertaken.

"Speculators who claim 'inside' knowledge of the reclamation plans of the board should be shunned, as no advance information of such plans has been or will be given out.

"After the survey and investigation of a proposed project has been made, as required by provisions of the reclamation act, if such project is approved by the board due publicity will be given to the matter by those having authority to do so."

**MANY WAR RELICS
ON TROPHY TRAIN**

BATTLE MATERIAL CAPTURED
BY 91ST DIVISION TO BE
EXHIBITED HERE.

A special train of seven cars containing captured war material won by the 91st Division will leave Spokane April 25 for a complete tour of Washington. More than 1200 different pieces of ordnance, small arms and munitions are embodied in the exhibit. It is known as the "Victory Trophy Train."

A returned artilleryman who operated one of the famous French "75" field guns will demonstrate the piece which is a part of the exhibit. This is the gun for which Germany is credited with having vainly sacrificed 35,000 of the flower of her army. When the prize was captured it was found that the brave knot of French artillerymen who defended it had destroyed the breech and firing mechanism before "going west."

The Germans experimenting with this captured "75" and evolved the copy which is known as the German "77." Two of these guns are shown in the exhibit. These "77's" were widely advertised by the Imperial German government as superior to the "75." However, they were found in action to be so vastly inferior to the "75" that our boys captured whole batteries of them.

Minnewerfers, flame throwers, projectiles, death bombs and huge trench mortars form part of the exhibition. A famous little French mosquito tank with its history engraven in bullet and shrapnel marks on its battered sides, will be described by a returned hero. This tank was employed in desperate fighting on the Western Front when put out of action by German artillery, its drivers continuing to man their guns until both were killed in their saddles.

Another section of this unique train carries German Albatross airplane motors, which were shot down by Northwest air men. All of the relics are blood spattered and war battered.

Wherever it has travelled the Victory Train has drawn great crowds of interested persons whose attention has been gripped by the stories and expressions of the demonstrators. The train will be in charge of Lieut. H. T. Hanover, who enthusiastically urges citizens of the state to avail themselves of the opportunity to view the prizes won by the men of the Wild West Division.

The train will visit Olympia Saturday, May 3, arriving here from Aberdeen at 7:30 in the morning and remaining one hour.

**HAYS URGES ALL TO
AID VICTORY LOAN**

REPUBLICAN NATIONAL CHAIR-
MAN ASKS PARTISANSHIP
BE PUT ASIDE.

"Our first duty as Republicans today is that duty which we have never failed and never will fail to anticipate and discharge—our duty as Americans. Just as during the recent war we determined our every act by how we could do most for effective action, so now we will measure our every step by how we can contribute most to the nation's welfare.

"To that end we will abandon all other activities to aid in the Victory Loan until its success has been accomplished."

This is the essential feature of a statement issued this week by Will H. Hays, chairman of the Republican national committee, in anticipation of the Victory Loan campaign which starts next Monday.

While the call was publicly issued to all Republicans, it was also sent directly and personally to all Republican national committeemen, state chairmen, all state organization workers, all county chairmen and all precinct committeemen and to all Republican newspapers, asking them to suspend all political activities until the success of the loan had been assured.

thoroughly convinced that he would be benefited more in the summer months by the climate of Puget Sound than by any other he could find. For that reason he is apt to insist upon remaining in Olympia or at least at some point on the Sound. If the governor remains in the state and continues to show improvement in his health he undoubtedly will insist upon taking a more active part in state affairs.

The chill of autumn and winter, however, are feared by the governor's physician and family, so if he stays on in Washington for the summer, Governor Lister undoubtedly will go to a warmer climate for the fall and winter. He may go either to Southern California, as he has suggested, or to Honolulu, as his family and friends have urged. It is felt there is no advantage in the climate of the Hawaiian Islands or California at present, however.

To encourage him to seek a complete recovery the legislature appropriated \$5,000 for a trip for Governor Lister, and the executive plans to follow the legislative plan, though undecided as to when he will go away.
