

SPEAKERS IN CHURCH ATTACK BOLSHIEVIKI

CHURCHGOERS APPLAUD EFFORTS TO COMBAT PROPAGANDA OF RADICALS.

Denouncing the Bolsheviki and radicals of similar proclivities in this country, E. B. Fish and John Anderson addressed several hundred Olympia churchgoers at the first regular union meeting of this summer at the United Churches Sunday evening. Mr. Fish was introduced as the prin-

cipal speaker of the evening, and the large audience greeted his epigrams with frequent and enthusiastic bursts of applause.

The Anderson system, of which Mr. Anderson is founder and in which Mr. Fish is a worker, is devoted to the neutralization of revolutionary propaganda. Its special field is in the logging camps. A second object is to supply the men in the camps with wholesome means of entertainment in order to counteract the tendency to gambling, drunkenness, and general moral deterioration. The means used are the collection and distribution to loggers of used books and periodicals, the supplying of speakers and singers to the camps, and efforts to Americanize foreigners.

Boxes have been placed on the streets of Seattle, Tacoma and other cities in which literature can be

placed by the public. From the contents of these boxes is sorted out all radical and seditious matter, and the rest is sent to the camps. In this way 18 tons of literature have been distributed to the lumbermen in the past year. The number of camps served in this way is 182; in addition 177 speeches have been made in lumber camps.

Just before the close of the meeting Rev. H. S. Templeton suggested that Olympia should have some such boxes on the streets, in order that the people here might have a chance to help supply wholesome literature to the loggers and lumbermen.

Mr. Fish asserted that the Bolsheviki, the I. W. W. and other radicals have but one big idea, which is to get what the other fellow has without working for it. This, he said, is their primary object, and the means to it are murder and anarchy.

Mr. Anderson, a native of Sweden who came to this country in 1885, described the migration of Swedes to this country and how they are promptly reached by the I. W. W. This organization has a sort of club at its headquarters in Seattle, and there it invites the immigrant to stop while in the city, having his mail sent there from the old country and meeting his friends there.

In the logging and lumber camps, he declared, there is often not a single book or magazine. As the mails do not reach these places regularly, there is no supply of newspapers and letters. The men quit work at about 4:30 in the afternoon and are through with supper at about 5 o'clock. In the four or five hours remaining before they go to bed they have nothing to do but gamble, tell obscene stories, and listen to I. W. W. propaganda.

PARK FIRM LEASES LONGMIRE SPRINGS

FAMOUS MT. RAINIER PROPERTY
PASSES FROM PIONEER
FAMILY

The famous Longmire Springs property in Rainier National park has been leased to the Rainier National Park company, giving it now exclusive operation of all the park facilities, it was announced this week.

The property, approximately 19 acres in extent, embraces the famous soda, sulphur and iron springs from which the location takes its name, the recently constructed Longmire hotel, and numerous other smaller and less important buildings.

The property possesses more historical interest than any other section of the park. James Longmire, the discoverer of the springs, left the plains with his wife and family in 1853 and crossed the Cascades in the first party across Natches pass. They settled in Yelm, whence Longmire used to make frequent trips back into the mountains. In 1870 he accompanied P. B. Van Trump and General Hazard Stevens as far as the present southern boundary of the park on the

trip which resulted in the first ascent of the mountain.

The springs were discovered by Longmire in 1853, and he and his family used to make trips in there every summer. He finally acquired possession of the land around the springs through patenting rights on an iron mine, his workings of the mine still being visible.

During the last 30 years the Longmires and associated interests have built extensively around the springs, operating two hotels and a tent camp in addition to the business in thermal, sulphur and other baths which were easily furnished by the springs which bubbled up all over the property.

MOST FIRES CAUSED BY PILING ASHES CARELESSLY

Garbage Hastily Dumped in Alleys Is Source of Most Conflagrations, Says M. W. Wisner.

Dumping of ashes in back yards and alleys produced more fire loss in Olympia than any other cause during the past year, according to M. W. Wisner, assistant chief of the fire department.

"Few people realize what a chance there is for a fire to get started when ashes are dumped," Mr. Wisner says. "Ashes which seem perfectly cold and give out no smoke or light are very likely to be the source of a fire that will burn a house down. Unless put in a metal can they are apt to come in contact with wood or paper, with disastrous results."

Mr. Wisner advocates a municipal garbage collection system such as those in Seattle and Spokane.

Electric wiring, formerly the cause of many fires, now produces little loss, he says. This is because of the stringency of the regulations under which it is now installed. Mice and matches are occasional causes of fires.

FALLS FROM WINDOW; DIES

Two-Year-Old Child Fatally Injured While Visiting Here.

Injuries sustained when he fell from a window in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Guiles Saturday evening, resulted in the death Monday morning of Daniel Edward, the 2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred W. Robbins of Union City, who were visiting at the Guiles home.

The youngster was playing around the house when he pushed a screen out of an open window and fell out on to the ground, his head striking on the sharp stub left where a rose-bush had been cut down.

The funeral took place at the Jesse T. Mills chapel Monday afternoon. Rev. J. H. Secor, pastor of the First M. E. church, officiating, and interment was made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.


