WILL PAVE TWO BLOCKS ON WEST SIXTH STREET

Council Lets Contracts for Work on Streets and Pipe to Improve City Water System.

Sixth street, the only unpaved street in Olympia's business district, will be paved from Main to Water street as a result of action taken by the city council Tuesday evening.

The contract for grading, graveling and paving was let to J. F. Forbes at a figure of \$13,967.15. One large new garage has recently been located on Sixth and Columbia, and another building is contemplated on the opposite corner, which was recently sold.

Eighteen thousand feet of wood stave pipe will be bought from James Martin, the lowest bidder, for \$2,270. This pipe will be used to connect the pumping station and the wells from which the city's water supply is obtained.

A contract for grading and graveling Bravne avenue, on the Westside, was let to James & Hendrix for \$3,835.30. A petition was received asking for the paving of the alley between Tenth and Union streets.

U. S. Prices for Food at Olympia

Postmaster James Doherty has been advised that postage charges on foodstuffs purchased from the war department through the postoffice department will be based on first zone rates although Olympia is in the fifth zone. This is not to be construed as a reduction of postal rates by the postoffice department, although it materially reduces the charges. The difference between the first and fifth zone rates will be paid to the postal department by the war department. On this basis of postage prices in effect for Olympia people follow:

THE FARM REFUSES TO STAND ARDIZE.


Cost of production on the farm is hard to figure. In the past the department of agriculture has had some unhappy results in trying to arrive at estimates that could stand the test of analysis. The fact is, of course, that each farm is pretty much a law unto itself, and, as in other industries, has costs of production that are particularly its own.

Upon the proper procedure for discovering the reasonable cost of production of a farm product the secretary of agriculture has taken the advice of a committee, and in order to follow out the committee's conclusions now asks congress for \$600,000 to spend in the next 12 months, largely upon cost of production, but also in studying farm labor, the proper organization of a farm, and farm finance.

All of this should assist in getting farming upon a business basis.—The Nation's Business.

LOCATING A POULTRY HOUSE

Select a location for a poultry house that has natural drainage away from the building. A dry, porous soil, such as sand or gravelly loam, is preferable to a clay soil.


