

KILLS FRIEND HE THINKS IS BEAR

CENTRALIA HUNTING PARTY HAS FATAL ENDING IN WOODS NEAR TONO.

Mistaken for a bear by a companion on a hunting trip, Roy George

Perry, 19, was shot and instantly killed just before noon Saturday. The shooting occurred in an out-of-the-way place in the woods between the Little Hannaford and Tono, and it was several hours before news of Perry's death reached Centralia.

Perry went hunting Saturday morning with Palmer DeChazzo, George Palmer and Earl Riley. The party went to the Teitzel place, on the Little Hannaford, and then struck off into the woods in the direction of Tono.

In the woods the party separated and a short time later De Chazzo shot

at what he thought to be a bear, according to reports of the affair. The bullet struck Palmer in the back and came out of his side, striking his arm with sufficient force to break the elbow.

Perry was born in Wenatchee March 28, 1900, and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. George D. Perry of Centralia. He was employed as a fireman on the Northern Pacific railway. Besides his parents he leaves two brothers, Waldo and Harold Perry of this city, and a sister, Miss Mabel Perry of Seattle.

HART PROCLAIMS ROOSEVELT WEEK

GOVERNOR URGES STUDY AND RECITAL OF FORMER PRESIDENT'S CREED.

Study and recital of Roosevelt's creed is urged upon parents and children of the state by Governor Louis F. Hart in designating this week as Americanization and Roosevelt week. The governor's official proclamation follows:

"Theodore Roosevelt is now, by history, being placed at the side of Lincoln and Washington as the third of the nation's triumvirate of patriots. That his counsel and guidance could not be had even one more year is the sad misfortune of an entire people. Though Roosevelt, the man, is gone, yet may the product of his work exist forever, and his words be heard always throughout the land.

"Accordingly I, Louis F. Hart, acting governor of the state of Washington, by virtue of the authority in me vested, do hereby proclaim October 20 to 27, 1919, as Americanization and Roosevelt Memorial week.

"It is urged that during that time each citizen of this state make every effort himself to acquire and to teach to others the Roosevelt principles for guidance of the individual and of the nation. To that end it is requested that all parents shall teach to the children of this state for recital in the homes and schools on October 27 excerpts of the writings and speeches of Roosevelt, and particularly the following Roosevelt creed:

"I believe in honesty, sincerity and the square deal; in making up one's mind what to do—and doing it.
 "I believe in fearing God and taking one's own part.
 "I believe in hitting the line hard when you are right.
 "I believe in speaking softly and carrying a big stick.
 "I believe in hard work and honest sport.
 "I believe in a sane mind in a sane body.
 "I believe we have room for but one soul loyalty, and that is loyalty to the American people."

Seeks Divorce at Centralia. Beulah Case of Centralia filed suit in the Lewis county superior court Saturday for a divorce from Glenn Case, alleging non-support and desertion as her grounds for action. The

couple were married in Olympia October 28, 1916. There is one child, aged 11 months. In addition to the decree the plaintiff asks that her maiden name of Beulah Shearer be restored.

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COUNTRY WOMEN GET TOGETHER IN CLUBS

FORM COMMUNITY SOCIETIES TO TAKE PLACE OF RED CROSS.

"The women in the rural communities have missed the Red Cross to such an extent that they are now forming clubs throughout Thurston county which will afford them the social and educational intercourse that they gained during the war time by being brought together by the Red Cross."

This is the statement of Miss Myrtle Boone, home demonstration agent for Thurston county.

Miss Boone reports that the community club idea is proving very popular with the women of Thurston county. During this last month four of the clubs have been formed. One has been organized at Mud Bay which has for its purpose the study of home problems—cooking, sewing, home saving devices. This club will hold a meeting next Monday, October 27.

The Rochester Community club, formed recently, has for its main object the furnishing of a community hall. The women in this club intended to buy a piano and other furnishings for this community hall, which is so greatly needed in the Rochester community.

Two P. T. A. circles were organized which correspond largely with the community clubs. These two new county circles are at Bainier and South Bay. Miss Boone further points out that the consolidated school district is doing a great good in this state in bringing the rural people together.

Miss Boone states that the four clubs which have been formed are planning to obtain speakers, arrange for lyceum courses and in general to provide entertainment of the right sort for the entire community.

APPEAL TO AMERICANS TO AID JEWS IN EUROPE

Thurston County Asked to Give \$3,580 to Help Starving People.

Southwestern Washington residents have been asked to aid the suffering Jewish people of eastern and central Europe, where millions are reported starving to death, among them more than 800,000 women and children.

The total quota for Southwestern Washington, including Tacoma and Pierce county, is \$67,748. Tacoma is now raising \$30,000 and quotas for other counties in the district are: Grays Harbor county, \$9,207; Lewis, \$6,420; Thurston, \$3,580; Mason, \$1,100; Pacific, \$3,172; Cowlitz, \$2,148; Clarke, \$4,450, and Wahkiakum, \$435.

The organization for Southwestern Washington will be perfected at once by L. H. Burnett of Tacoma chairman of the entire district. This is the first time in history that the Jews have turned to the Gentiles for aid, but the burden is so great in the war-devastated countries such as Poland, Galicia, Palestine, Rumania and Lithuania, that millions will starve to death and unless aid is sent from America the death rate will be appalling. Money is being sent as fast as collected and it is hoped that the full quota for Southwestern Washington will be raised before November 1.

Harry L. Parr, attorney for John Solbeck, has filed notice of appeal in the superior court in the case of the State of Washington versus John Solbeck. Police Judge Walter Crosby fined Solbeck \$250 and costs in the justice court last week. Solbeck was charged with having intoxicating liquor in his possession.

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
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
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
