Proposed Bee School Attracting Inquiries Throughout Western Washington.

The Beekeepers' Association of Thurston County will hold its regular monthly meeting at 1:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon, November 27, in the assembly hall of the Chamber of Commerce. Fred Mandery, bee inspector for Thurston county, will give a lecture on the proper method of handling bees.

The bee school which is to be held in Olympia on December 15, 16 and 17, is attracting inquiries from all parts of Western Washington, according to E. B. Stookey, county agent. Elizabeth Dickerson, of the Washington bee farm in King county, has announced that she will attend, and Mr. Atkins, formerly an extension worker in Iowa, but now with the Lewis Bros. Bee Supply Company, will take part in the program. H. A. Scullen, of the extension division of the Oregon Agricultural college, formerly at Pullman, will fill two dates on the program.

The Northwest community has already delegated 15 persons to attend the bee school. Hays district has announced 10 delegates, Rochester 5, Lacey 10, and 10 other communities are preparing to send quotas to make a good sized convention of beekeepers.

Bucoda has a cash balance of \$1,198.54; Tumwater, \$1,317.33 and Tenino has a cash balance of \$4,934.77. Delinquent taxes which are due, if collected would swell the cash balance of each of the three towns greatly.
