

WILL TEST LEGALITY SOLDIERS' BONUS BILL

ATTORNEY GENERAL THOMPSON FILES PETITION FOR WRIT OF MANDATE

SUPREME COURT ARBITER

State Board of Finance Orders Auditor Clausen to Issue Warrant For \$1,000.

To test the legality of the soldiers' bonus bill adopted by referendum action of the voters of the state at the general election, Attorney General Thompson Tuesday filed in the supreme court petition for writ of mandate to compel State Auditor C. W. Clausen to issue a warrant for the payment of \$1,000 from the school fund for a bond of like denomination issued by the state board of finance as administrator of the provisions of the bonus bill.

Board Offers Bonds for Sale. The board, as administrator of the bonds, offered for sale one of the \$1,000 bonds which it is proposed to issue and then, in its capacity as custodian of the permanent state funds, adopted a resolution to purchase from itself this \$1,000 bond as an investment for that amount of the state permanent school fund, and ordered the state auditor to issue a warrant for that amount.

Elect Local Farm Bureau Officials To Carry Out Extension Program Next Year.

The Lakamus community, including the Des Chutes district, held its reorganization meeting of the local unit of the Farm Bureau on Wednesday, December 1. Miss Ruth Kennedy home demonstration agent, and W. H. Dunham, county club leader, represented the extension division service of the state college.

One silo study tour, one pickle club, 100 per cent of the cows tested for tuberculosis, one livestock study club, 100 swarms of bees, one demonstration of the transfer of the bees and one lecture on bees, one potato grading demonstration, one fertilizer demonstration on three types of soil, three manure sheds, one crop study tour in cooperation with Yelm, poultry work, demonstration on the renovation of old orchards, an horticultural institute, child welfare work, hot lunch in the school, one canning club, two sewing circles, ten dress forms, one textile testing and judging school, one pressure cooker demonstration, four kitchens rearranged, one home convenence show, and one home lighting system installed using water power.
