 H. B. 26, by David—An act relating to drainage, authorizing the incurring of indebtedness to complete work necessary to secure benefits, validating indebtedness heretofore incurred for such purpose and providing for assessments according to actual benefits.  
 H. B. 27, by Davis—An act appropriating \$1,200,000 for operation of state institutions and offices to April 1, 1921.  
 H. B. 28, by R. A. Tripple—An act licensing dental hygienists and providing their duties and rights.  
 H. B. 29, by O. R. McKinney—An

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act relating to the manufacture and sale of milk products and to prevent their adulteration.  
 H. B. 30, by Pliny L. Allen—An act providing for Americanization instruction for adults and appropriating \$120,000 from the current state school fund for this purpose.  
 H. B. 31, by F. G. Remann—An act appropriating \$17,719.90 from the Capitol building fund for payment to the Walker Cut Stone Company for services performed.  
 H. B. 32, by F. G. Remann—An act establishing the amount for which any lot or tract of land in a commercial waterway district may be charged with a lien for its proportionate part of the maximum benefits assessed against the same.  
 H. B. 33, by J. T. Rattis—An act providing that the American flag be displayed at the polls at all state, county and municipal elections.  
 H. B. 34, by A. A. Kelley—Memorializing Congress to fix a tariff upon the importation of seeds to protect growers in this country from "destructive competition."

House Bills introduced in the House Thursday:  
 H. J. M. 5, by Roads and Bridges Committee—Memorializing Congress to make an appropriation for the construction of rural post roads.  
 H. B. 48, by Roads and Bridges Committee—Reappropriating \$350,651.09 from the public highway fund, and \$431,200 from the motor vehicle fund for completing and maintaining work under contract and construction.  
 H. B. 49, by Roads and Bridges Committee—Appropriating \$4,400,000 from permanent highway fund for completing work already under contract.  
 H. B. 50, by Roads and Bridges Committee—Appropriating \$400,000 from the motor vehicle fund, \$200,000 of it from funds to be appropriated for the east side and \$200,000 for the west side for use of state highway board.  
 H. B. 51, by C. C. Aspinwall—An act amending the act relating to the selection, exemption and service of jurors by providing the county assessors instead of the clerk shall prepare lists of persons qualified to serve and that women may claim exemption.  
 H. B. 52, by A. E. McLean—Providing for the survey of an extension of the Roosevelt Highway easterly to a connection with the Sunset Highway, from Pateros, Okanogan county, to Coulee City.  
 H. B. 53, by A. E. McLean—Providing for the survey of a proposed secondary highway from Okanogan to Connell.  
 H. B. 54, by L. L. Miller—Providing for a department of inspection of steam boilers and pressure vessels to be under supervision of the State Safety Board.  
 H. B. 51, by Robert A. Tripple—An act amending Section 7520 R. and B. code to provide for appointment of associate police judges in cities of first class to receive \$15 a day for each day of actual duty.  
 H. B. 56, by C. E. Hughes—An act relating to entry of sheriff's deeds in the book of levies by Superior Court clerks and repealing Section 604 of R. and B. Code.  
 H. B. 57, by J. M. Harrison, B. W. Moore and Anna K. Golwell—Amending the motor vehicle fund act to provide that one-third of the motor vehicle fund shall be paid into the public highway fund and the balance distributed among the several counties in proportions to collections for permanent highway maintenance, provided that cities of first class get 15 per cent.  
 H. B. 58, by Hughes and Kresky—An act relating to the relief of soldiers, sailors and marines and their families.

The following bills were introduced in the House today:  
 H. B. 59, by Kirkman—An act relating to taxation of inheritances.  
 H. B. 60, by Meserve—An act providing for surveys and investigations and reports on location of bridges over Columbia river between the states of Washington and Oregon. Referred to committee on Roads and Bridges.  
 H. B. 60, by Meserve—An act providing for surveys and investigations and reports on location of bridges over Columbia river between the states of Washington and Oregon. Referred to committee on Roads and Bridges.  
 H. B. 61, by Committee on Horticulture and Forestry—An act relating to state forests, authorizing the state board of forest commissioners to correct errors in forest protection assessments on the county tax rolls. Referred to committee on Horticulture and Forestry.  
 H. B. 62, by Committee on horticulture and forestry—An act relating to state forests, authorizing the designation of places for camping grounds where fires may be kindled. Referred to committee on Horticulture and Forestry.  
 H. B. 63, by Committee on constitutional revision—An act providing for the amendment of section 4, of article 8 of the constitution relating to the expenditure of moneys in the state treasury.  
 H. B. 64, by Manogue—An act relating to the use of automatic speed control devices on motor vehicles and fixing a penalty for violation thereof.

Senate Bills introduced in the senate Tuesday:  
 S. B. 23, by Davis and Sinclair—Providing for sale of revolvers and pistols and ammunition therefor under permits to be issued by peace officers.  
 S. B. 24, by Hutchinson—Proposing that a constitutional amendment providing for an old age pension for persons attaining the age of 65 who have resided in the state the 20 years preceding, be submitted to the voters at the November, 1922, election, the pension funds to be raised by a poll tax.  
 S. B. 25, by Renick—Amending section 6 of the act entitled "the protection and propagation of game birds and animals," to include mammals.  
 S. B. 26, by Fawcett—Providing that each school child under 14, if he so desires, shall be furnished with not less than one-half pint of milk on each school day.  
 S. B. 27, by Wray—Appropriating

\$2,400 for salaries and expenses of state board of architect examiners.

S. B. 28, by Palmer—Providing for the repeal of chapter 6 of the Session Laws of 1919, which provides for the assessment and collection of an annual license tax on dogs.

S. B. 30, by Fawcett—Putting all banks of state under depositors' guaranty fund law.

Bills introduced in the senate Wednesday:

S. B. 31, by Committee on State, Granted, School and Tide Lands—Directing public land commissioner to give W. C. Bentley a correction deed for certain lands in Jefferson county.  
 S. B. 32, by Senator Taylor—Changing name of McClellan Pass highway in King and Yakima counties to Naches Pass highway.  
 S. B. 33, by Senator Palmer—Fixing the opening and closing hours of state offices at 9 to 4 o'clock and of counties having a population of 80,000 and of cities of the first class from 8 to 5 o'clock; providing further for 1 o'clock closing on Saturdays.

S. B. 34, by Senator Loomis—An act relating to lease on mineral, oil, oil shale and gas lands.  
 S. B. 35, by Senator Westfall—An act relating to improvements in cities and towns, and amending section 7892-12 of Remington and Ballinger's Code to provide that cities of first-class under commission form of government shall have authority to construct water mains and sanitary sewers without limit of cost proportioned to value of property.

S. B. 36, by Senator Hutchinson—Relating to registration of land titles and amending section 8818 and 8821 R. and B. code; providing that in lieu of abstract person can file with clerk of court a certificate of title insurance or guarantee title upon payment of fee of \$5 to the examiner of titles and such certificates shall be considered evidence of facts warranted by guarantee therein.  
 S. B. 37, by Senator Wray—Appropriating \$31,951.22 from public highway fund to Erickson Construction company for services performed.  
 Senate Joint Resolution 2, Roads and Bridges Committee—Relating to employment of engineer to assist the state highway commissioner and the chief engineer for public service commission to investigate feasibility of establishing a cement state-owned plant or plants.  
 Senate Joint Resolution 3, by Senator Bishop—Providing for joint conference by committees from legislatures of Washington and Oregon on matters relating to fisheries on the Columbia river.  
 S. B. 38, by Wray—Making appropriations for the department of agriculture, \$10,000 for work of eradicating bovine tuberculosis and \$10,000 for the state fair available up to March 31 next. Referred to the appropriations committee.  
 S. B. 39, by Committee on Roads and Bridges—Appropriating \$4,400,000 from the permanent highway fund to complete contracts and con-

struction work now in force on permanent highways and for making payments on new contracts and for maintenance of permanent highways and declaring an emergency. This act merely appropriates funds raised by fixed levy by counties and returns to counties funds for their use.  
 S. B. 40, by Committee on Roads and Bridges—Reappropriating public highway and motor vehicle license funds for construction and maintenance of established highways and declaring an emergency, was put on the general file.  
 S. B. 41, by Wray—Making appropriation of \$15,315.22 to cover deficits in the public service commission. Bills introduced Thursday:

S. B. 38, by Wray—Appropriating \$10,000 for bovine tuberculosis eradication work, and \$10,000 for Washington state fair.  
 S. B. 39, by Committee on Roads and Bridges—Appropriating \$3,400,000 from the permanent highway fund for completing work already under contract and for new contracts on and the maintenance of public highways.  
 S. B. 40, by Committee on Roads and Bridges—Appropriating \$350,651.09 from the public highway fund and \$431,200 from the motor vehicle fund for completing work and construction on certain roads.  
 S. B. 41, by Wray—Appropriating

\$15,315.22 for the public service commission for the biennium ending March 31.  
 S. B. 42, by Hastings—Providing for the acquisition, by gift, bequest or purchase, of lands by counties and cities for the purpose of erecting memorials to commemorate American soldiers killed in the World war.  
 S. J. R. 5, by Fawcett—Providing for the appointment of a joint committee of two members of the senate and three members of the house to investigate the failure of the Scandinavian-American bank of Tacoma, with a view to determining if such failure was caused by defects in the state banking laws.

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
