

PROUD HUNGARY WILL NEVER BEG DECLARES HORTHY

By MAJOR E. J. SWIFT, of San Francisco. (Written for the United Press.) BUDAPEST. (By Mail).—Hungary will never become a beggar among nations, as have some countries.

This was the declaration of Admiral Horthy, president-governor of Hungary, in an interview. "We have never asked for charity and never will," the Admiral continued.

Admiral is Cordial. The governor-president has a cordial manner. He is very short and stocky, with piercing black eyes, a big nose, a belligerent chin, and rather thin lips.

The financial situation in Hungary is showing marked improvement," said Horthy. "The krona is now 300 to the dollar, which means that its market value is rising with remarkable rapidity when compared to the value of the surrounding countries."

The rise in the value of the krona will result, Admiral Horthy thinks, in an alleviation of the food shortage in Budapest, which has been serious, owing to the refusal of the peasants to exchange good food for worthless money.

Strongest party, and the confiscatory measures in vogue in Austria are impossible here. The collapse of industry in Budapest due to the coal shortage, has created the phenomenon of starvation in a city which is the center of one of the richest agricultural districts in the world.

Short of Fabrics. According to the governor-president, the shortage of fabrics of all kinds is causing great suffering, particularly among small children and in institutions.

Conditions among working men are steadily improving," continued Horthy. "Miners now receive 6,500 krona a month as a minimum, and this is a living wage for Hungary.

Olympia Box and Package Company Rushed With Northwest Orders

VENEER MARKET REGAINS STRENGTH

Prospective Stockholders Send Inquiries from Many Communities on Coast

Inquiries from prospective stockholders are being received from many points throughout British Columbia, Washington, Oregon and California by the Olympia Box and Package company, according to George W. Hutton, president of the new cooperative concern which has taken over the plant and business of the Pacific Veneer company.

Last week two carloads of stock were shipped out, and this week the output is expected to equal that amount. Orders are pouring in from Portland, Hood River, Puyallup and White Salmon for strawberry boxes and crates.

Mr. Hutton attributes the heavy demand to the expectation of a heavy yield of strawberries combined with the fact that most of the private veneer and box factories are shut down.

Install Four Machines. Four machines for making berry boxes, two motive power, and two foot power, were received by the company last week which were purchased through the Star Machinery company of Seattle, and made by the St. Joe Iron Works of St. Joe, Michigan.

The market for panels and veneer stock in general has strengthened considerably during the last few weeks, according to Mr. Hutton, and the prospects for an active season are very bright.

Need More Men. The Olympia Box and Package company was incorporated on April 18, 1921, with a capital stock of \$50,000.

Officers elected at the first business meeting are: George W. Hutton, president; James C. Sams, vice president; Harry E. VanArsdale, secretary; Howard H. Farrington, treasurer; Frank B. Myers and James O. Marts, trustees.

The incorporators aim to give local men the first opportunity to join the company, which is organized on a strictly co-operative basis.

LOYAL LEGION FINES SIX LARGE LUMBER COMPANIES. PORTLAND, Ore., May 18.—Six large lumber companies throughout the Northwest have been fined \$500 each for failing to live up to bonded agreement, according to an announcement made by the directorate of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, in session here.

The companies fined were the Coos Bay Lumber company, Marshfield, Ore.; Charles K. Spaulding Logging company, Salem, Ore.; Schaefer Brothers Logging company, Satsop, Wash.; Willamette Valley Lumber company, Dallas, Ore.; Natron Mills & Lumber company, Natron, Wash.; and Wheeler-Reese Lumber company, Harding, Wash.

Violations of wage agreements constituted a majority of the offenses.

AMERICAN INDUSTRY SHOULD HAVE SKELETON ORGANIZATION FOR WAR. Declares Bernard M. Baruch, Former Chairman of War Industries Board.

BY HAROLD D. JACOBS. NEW YORK, May 18.—American industry should be maintained in the same degree of preparedness for war as the army and navy, according to Bernard M. Baruch.

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The modern application of George Washington's admonition—"In time of peace prepare for war"—is explained by Baruch in his book "American Industry in the War," which is in effect a report of the War Industries Board, of which he was chairman.

A peace-time skeletonized organization along the same lines as the War Industries Board should be established to provide congress with accurate and complete information regarding all industries, and to form the nucleus of a new board in case of another war.

The government should encourage and assist in the development of the production of certain essential materials, used both in war and peace, which have been virtual monopolies in other countries in the past.

Need Skeleton Organization. Manufacturers should be prevailed upon to maintain under government supervision the skeleton organizations in certain departments through which rapid manufacture of munitions and war materials could be developed.

"There should be established a peace-time skeleton organization following the lines of the War Industries Board," Baruch says.

"It should be headed by a chairman who should have associated with him the chiefs of the centralized purchasing bureaus of the army, of the navy, and of any other government department which might be called upon to make large purchases in case of war.

"During the war the country was constantly threatened with a shortage in available supply of nitrogen, manganese, chrome, tungsten, dyes, coal tar derivatives, and several other essential materials. These materials had always been imported.
