**Obituary.**

William T. Murphy was born in Darle county, Ohio, February 24, 1832. Where he was married on June 29, 1851 to Miss Lucinda Lattimore. To this union were born ten children four of whom are living. Mr. Murphy came to Nebraska with his family in 1876. He took a homestead in Smith county, Kans, but Red Cloud, was his trading point. On June 7, 1892 his wife died, on November 30, 1894, his second marriage occurred when he was married to Mrs. Rebecca Gouch, who died October 28, 1901.

Mr. Murphy was a soldier in the Civil war, being a member of Company K, 534 regiment of Indiana, enrolled October, 13, 1864, and discharged July 21, 1865.

Mr. Murphy died at the home of his son-in-law A. B. Wiggins, July 6 1904, aged 72 years, 4 months and 12 days.

Funeral services were held at the home of A. B. Wiggins, July 7, at 10 o'clock conducted by Rev. W. T. Taylor, pastor of the M. E. church at Inavale. Interment took place in the Red Cloud cemetery. Members of the G. A. R. acted as pall-bearers and conducted the services at the grave. He leaves three daughters and one son to mourn his loss.
