Saloon Men At Superior Lose

The licenses of three Superior, Neb., saloonkeepers, the granting of which ceased such a furor last spring, were illegally issued and must be cancelled according to a decision handed down by the supreme court Monday morning.

The supreme court held that the pretended ordinance under which the licenses were issued was invalid, as it contained no regulations as to what officers should handle the applications and the bonds and sign the license. Furthermore the court held that the petitions for licenses did not contain the necessary allegations concerning the respectability, character, standing and residence of the applicants.

An ordinance adopted in April prohibited the sale of liquor in Superior. Another ordinance, adopted in May, allowed it. The three applicants were John A. Doerr, Andrew Fize and Charles E. Abbott.

The demonstrators against the granting of the licenses were overruled by the district court and appealed to the supreme court. The latter's decision reverses the lower tribunal and directs it to order the licenses cancelled.—Tuesday's Lincoln Daily Star.

Citizens Mass Meeting

The citizens' mass meeting held at the court house last Thursday was well attended, there being representative tax payers from nearly every part of the county. The meeting was called to order and presided over by Mr. N. V. Anderson.

After the selection of a secretary and the appointing of a committee on resolutions, the questions of state tax and state legislation and many seemingly useless appointive officers were thoroughly discussed. In course of due time, the committee on resolutions were asked to report, with the result that the following resolutions were adopted:

1st. We ask of the legislature to repeal the primary law and re-instate the old caucus and convention system.

2nd. We are opposed to the large appropriations to the University and Agricultural college.

3rd. We ask the legislature to encourage improvement and building on the farms by compelling the railroads to haul, at railroad rates, mixed building material such as cement, lumber, posts, etc., in same car, at highest rate for any article in car for such shipment.

4th. We ask the abolition of the farm demonstrator, which is an imposition and insult to the farmers of the state.

5th. We ask the legislature to abolish the office of County Assessor, which we consider entirely needless, together with many useless servants of the state house; such as gate-keepers, custodians, pages, and numerous janitors, with others at the state house during legislative sessions. Also to abolish a great many state boards, which are of no value to the taxpayers of the state.

6th. We ask the legislature for the repeal of Section 6, article 1, pertaining to county aid to county fairs.

7th. We ask that our legislators be instructed to introduce bill asking for the repeal of the law creating the legislative bureau.

8th. We ask that our legislators be instructed to introduce a bill asking for an amendment to school and university land lease law to read: all leases made prior to 1915 instead of 1878.

9th. We ask that the legislature pass a law giving rural school board power to add ninth and tenth grades to school if desired.

Resolved that a copy of these resolutions be given to the papers for publication.


Every one present demonstrated their appreciation of the new court house by extending a hearty vote of thanks to the county board for their achievement in this line.
