City "Dads" Hold Regular Meeting

The City Council met in regular session Tuesday evening with Mayor Damerall presiding. Members present: Koontz, Saladen and Caldwell.

The minutes of January 14th, meeting was read and approved. A committee from the Chamber of Commerce was present and presented the matter of opening the alley at the south end of Webster street, making a straight line to the railroad right of way.

A motion was made by Koontz and seconded by Caldwell that the Mayor appoint a committee of two from the Council and two from the Chamber of Commerce to confer with the property owners and ascertain the costs of converting the alley into a street. Motion carried. Mayor appointed Koontz and Saladen from the Council and President Maurer and Secretary Cowden of the Chamber of Commerce.

Report of S. R. Florence, City Treasurer, was read and ordered placed on file.

The matter of the old claim of George Clawson for \$30 wherein he claims that amount due for back salary in May 1914 was taken up. On motion the claim was referred back to Mr. Clawson to itemize the same and state when and where he worked. Motion carried.

A motion was made and seconded that \$65 be transferred from Water Fund to Water Levy Fund and \$60 from the Electric Light Fund to Electric Light Levy Fund and instruct the City Treasurer to take up out standing warrants in these funds. Carried.

Moved by Koontz and seconded by Saladen that Supt. Zeigler be instructed to have the power house reshingled. Carried.

J. M. Steward Laid At Rest

The following was taken from The Lancaster, Ohio, Daily Eagle under date of Saturday, January 22nd:

The body of Hon. J. M. Steward will arrive in Circleville, Sunday, evening from Red Cloud, Neb., where his death occurred Thursday at the age of 75 years. His remains will be taken to the home of his brother, Lewis Steward, who resides at the old Steward homestead at Dutch Hollow.

The funeral will be conducted on Monday, Jan. 24th at 1 o'clock p. m. at Dutch Hollow church, where as a boy he attended Sunday school and divine services each Sunday with his parents, brothers and sisters. He will be buried beside his wife, Amelia Dornick Steward, who died nine years ago.

Deceased was prominently connected with the Lancaster Public Schools as principal of the North building and served conspicuously as County Representative in the Legislature in '76, '77 and '78, and attracted much attention by always wearing a fur cap and arctic. He aspired to the office of State Treasurer the first time Judson Harmon was elected, but was not nominated.

He resided at Marcy, and left there eight years ago to make his home with his eldest son, Charles B. Steward at Red Cloud, Neb.

The following children survive and it is expected will be present at the obsequies: Charles B. of Red Cloud, Neb.; Clarence, of Bladen, Neb.; Effie, wife of Rev. Charles Herstein, of Sandusky, O.; Lewis M., of Saginaw, Mich.; Grace, wife of John Ambush, of Red Cloud, Neb.; Miss Florence M., music teacher, of Circleville. Also two brothers, Lewis W. of Dutch Hollow, Dr. Charles of Ashville, and one sister, Miss Sarah of Amanda. Deceased was always an active member of the Lutheran church.


