Fire at Bennington. A \$15,000 fire at Bennington Tuesday morning destroyed Fire Station No. 2, a grocery store and adjoining dwelling and damaged the stock in the Drysdale department store.

Lyman E. Pelton Dead. Lyman E. Pelton of Highgate, the oldest lawyer in Vermont, died suddenly at the home of his daughter, Mrs. George C. Holmes, Monday, Mr. Pelton had been in his usual vigorous health of late and had been able to go about the village without a cane.

Mr. Charles E. Clark of Barnet, proprietor of the Barnet Wagon works, died at his home April 19th of pneumonia. The funeral was held at Wolcott, where the deceased had formerly resided.

Tuesday morning, W. T. Dewey, one of the license commissioners of Montpelier, espied a drunken crowd near Nicholas Manor, across the river from the Central Vermont railway station, and with the assistance of officers landed five in jail.

In turning the wagon around the load was overturned on him, a wagon wheel passing over his head, breaking his lower jaw in several places and inflicting a scalp wound and other injuries.
