SERIOUS FIRE NARROWLY AVERTED.

What might have been a serious fire was narrowly averted at Barton Landing between eleven and twelve o'clock Saturday night. Fire from a hot box in the fan room of the dry kiln of the Chandler company, was discovered by night watchman Foley, shortly before eleven o'clock and at the time could have been extinguished by the assistant, but before help could be secured in answer to the fire alarm, the blaze had grown to such proportions that a smart fight of about two hours was necessary to get it under control. Although the fire company was on hand promptly and rendered effective work till the engine was out, it is thought by some that had it not been for the automatic fire extinguishers installed throughout the mills in the form of a sprinkler that works after the rooms get to a certain temperature, the kiln and the red mill at least would have burned, but as it was only about 25,000 feet of lumber were lost. Superintendent Doe of the mills and the citizens of Barton Landing are to be congratulated that the fire was not more serious. The total loss of lumber and damage to the building is considered about one thousand dollars.

ENTHUSIASTIC REPUBLICAN MEETING.

PROCTOR WAS THERE.

An enthusiastic meeting of the various republican town committees of this county met in Seaver's hall, in Barton, Friday afternoon, July 13, to discuss methods of carrying on the campaign in this county

and to organize to get the voters out on September 4th. F. C. Williams of Newport, the member of the state committee from this county, acted as chairman of the meeting and F. T. Caswell of Derby Line was elected secretary. The roll of the towns was called and every town but two responded by members of the town committees. Lively discussion followed as to the best method of getting the voters out, and it was finally left with each town committee to organize in their towns as thought best, Young Men's Republican clubs being advised. As the chairman introduced Hon. Fletcher D. Proctor, republican nominee for governor, the hall ran with cheers. Mr. Proctor in a few minutes talk spoke of the principles of the party and discussed the platform freely. This straightforward statement convinced every man in the hall that Mr. Proctor not only said what he believed, but believed what he said, and the hearty handshake given all was not the conventional political handshake, but had a sincerity about it that convinced everyone that he was a man among common men. Geo. H. Prouty and Horace F. Graham of Craftsbury, the republican nominees for lieutenant governor and auditor of accounts, were also present and spoke. Z. M. Mansur of Newport also spoke.
