IN HUB MARKETS

Quotations on Leading Products In Demand

Boston, Jan. 16.—Butter is very firm, in sympathy with New York and outside markets, but the trade is very slow to respond and prices are steady.

Cheese is steady and unchanged, with a fair demand. York state, 15 1/2 @ 16 1/4; Vermont, 14 3/4 @ 15 1/4.

Eggs stiffened up a little under the influence of cooler weather, but the supply of fresh gathered and nearby eggs is still large.

Sweet potatoes are held at high prices. There is little call for them, and the arrival of a few hundred barrels would send the market off.

Potatoes have cleaned up well and have gone up a little. There is a slow and indifferent demand for onions and tomatoes are not much called for.

FENCE POSTS MADE DURABLE.

Fence posts of many kinds of cheap woods which ordinarily would soon decay if set in the ground can be made to last for 25 years or a simple treatment with creosote.

Impregnation with creosote has been greatly cheapened by the introduction of the "open tank," which can be installed at a cost of from \$30 to \$45, or much less if an old boiler is used.

Experiments of the Forest Service show that with preservative treatment the durability of lodgepole pine in Idaho is increased 16 years.

The cost of creosote is there relatively high, yet by treating posts there is a saving, with interest at 6 per cent, of 2 cents per post yearly.

More important than the saving, however, is the fact that through preservative treatment other woods are fitted to take the place of cedar, of which the supply is rapidly becoming exhausted.

A detailed description of experiments in preserving fence posts, together with practical suggestions for treating them on a commercial scale, are contained in circular 117 of the Forest Service.

Question on Feeding Fowls. 1 Is it well to feed wet or sloppy feed to fowls? 2 Is beef blood good for chickens? 3 What benefit is derived from charcoal?

J. V. T. 1 Too wet food causes diarrhoea, dilutes the intestinal juices too much and soon knocks the chickens off their legs.

A good dough may be made of corn meal, oat meal, wheat bran and boiled vegetables mashed in the proportion of one-third of each, wet with milk or water, the farmer preferred.

Wet food may occasionally be allowed as a variety, but dry food is always better. 2 Beef blood is excellent, being rich in nitrogen, and nearly approaches the white of an egg in composition.

It may be thickened with a mixture of meal and bran, put in bag and boiled, or it may be mixed, if fresh with the regular soft food. Feed it only twice or three times a week, as it will cause bowel disease if too much is given.

3 Charcoal serves more as a corrective than any other purpose, as it is not digestible, being one of the most insoluble substances known. It corrects acidity and also partially serves as grit.

Cow Holding Back Milk. What shall be done with a cow that persists in holding back her milk? P. B.

Sometimes a strap buckled around the body directly in front of the udder will prove effectual. A ration of bran to be eaten during the process of milking will sometimes effect a cure; but some cows can never be cured of the habit, once they have acquired it.

It is best to begin with the calf and train her properly. The first calf may have been left with the mother too long, and when taken away she held back her milk. This habit of holding back the milk is almost incurable, and is largely due to the leaving of the first calf too long with the mother.


