## A BAD FIRE.

It was a disastrous fire Sunday night that destroyed the buildings of our aged and respected townsman, Levi Case. John Foster, who has worked and lived on the farm with his family did the chores and retired shortly after nine o'clock. About midnight the two oldest girls about 12 and 8 years of age aroused their father. He sprang out of bed and thinking of the horses rushed to the barn. He was too late to save them for the flames had made such headway he could not enter the barn. By the time he and his wife had saved their children, it was impossible to save anything of their household furnishings or clothing. The flames swept very rapidly from the barn into the ell part that was occupied by Mr. Foster and family. By very hard work a considerable part of the household effects of Mr. Case and family were saved. The property loss is very heavy. All the buildings were burned except the sugar house. This season's crop of hay was unusually large and it was all cut and put into the barn except two or three loads. A new buggy and surrey, harnesses, wagons carts, ploughs, harrows, in fact every farming tool was destroyed except a mowing machine and horse rake. Two horses, a two-year-old bull, a calf and a flock of hens were also burned. Much sympathy is felt for Mr. and Mrs. Levi Case. It was their home. It was there they had lived many years. It was there they expected to live out their natural life with their daughter, Miss Laura Case. And the blow falls especially hard upon them at their age in life. After the fire they went immediately to the home of their daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Stannard. Some trouble was experienced in raising the night operator at telephone central, finally the ringing of the church bell rallied a number of the firemen, who hurried to the scene as fast as possible and helped in saving movable property but because the buildings were nearly a mile from the village and the water system, they could do nothing to fight the fire. The loss by fire falls especially heavy upon Mr. and Mrs. John Foster and family, who lived and worked on the farm. Their family consists of themselves and seven children. They lost all their furniture, all their bedding, all their wearing apparel. When Monday morning came they were without shoes and stockings and with almost no clothing to wear. The people of Barton have contributed generously to the relief of the family.

**Another Makes Narrow Escape, Wagon Completely Demolished.**

A fatal accident occurred at the East Coventry railway crossing yesterday morning, when the Quebec flyer making 60 miles an hour, which is due at Barton at 7:16, ran into the team of Simon Rediker. The team contained Mr. Rediker, who was 87 years of age and Mr. Lampher. The men saw the on-coming train and Lampher tried to stop the team, but Mr. Rediker thought he could pass in safety and would not stop. Mr. Lampher jumped from the team just before it was struck by the train. The wagon was completely demolished and Mr. Rediker was thrown 50 feet against the station, killing him instantly. The horse escaped unhurt. Rediker came from Canada and had lived in the town of Coventry for several years. He leaves a wife to mourn his death.

## RECIPROCITY IS PASSED.

The Canadian Reciprocity bill was passed by the United States senate, Saturday afternoon, by a vote of 53 to 27, and will be signed by the president this Wednesday afternoon. Senator Page of Vermont, voted against the bill and Senator Dillingham was present but did not vote. Reciprocity is now up to Canada, and the Dominion parliament has again assembled to take up the consideration of the measure. The conservative opposition will resort to filibustering tactics to defeat the proposed treaty, but Premier Laurier in a statement said he would prorogue Parliament and appeal to the world through a general election if necessary to carry the proposed International agreement.

### "Feel to Hum."
