Orleans News Page

News and Views from this Hustling Village

Everybody's Doing It Now.

Practically everybody in Orleans has been taking advantage of the excellent fishing weather for the past week and many fine catches have been the result. If the state of Maine had such fishing as is to be found in this incorporated village the people there would organize, build a big summer hotel, sell the stock in Vermont and get the railroads to run excursion trains. Here we have about one hundred rods of good fishing in Willoughby river with perhaps a dozen good pools and yet it is probably true that more good game fish were caught here last week than were caught in the whole of the famous Sebago Lake during the same period. We happened to see an official bulletin issued by the General Passenger Agent of the Boston & Maine railroad, which gave the weight and number of fish caught in Sebago lake last week and that list seemed very insignificant when compared with the list of fish caught within the limits of the incorporated village of Orleans. It has not been unusual to find twenty-five fishermen on the shores of the river at five o'clock in the morning on any day of the past week and it is considered poor fishing unless at least a dozen nice rainbow trout are caught before breakfast. An equal number are caught during the day and after working hours at night. The smallest trout reported has weighed two pounds and the largest seven pounds and thirteen ounces. The latter makes the season's record. The largest trout caught here during seasons past weighed eight pounds and two ounces. The high record is held by Carl Willey and the season's record to date is held by Monty Tripp. Many of the local fishermen have caught more than the legal six pound limit in one day, the record for a day's catch being held by Tom Buzzo at ten pounds. Among those who have exceeded the limit are Tom Buzzo, A. H. Swett, Harley Tripp, Colby Stoddard, Hiram Allen, Harley Clough, Monty Tripp, Wilder Joslyn, Carl Willey, Clyde Willey and Mr. Wells. These lucky ones were not lawbreakers however for having less than six pounds they were entitled to catch one more fish. For instance Tom Buzzo had two fish, small ones weighing two and a half pounds each, and his third one weighed five pounds; Monty Tripp caught one weighing nearly eight pounds and Colby Stoddard had one weighing four pounds and caught another weighing three and three-quarters. With the possible exception of the salmon there is


