The weather was of such character that it prevented a large turnout at the advisory council meeting held at Barton, Nov. 5th, and it was decided that another meeting should be held in the very near future to take up the very important matters that are at hand.

The Derby Cow Testing association, which completed its first year of existence on No. 1st, has been re-organized and will hold a business meeting in the town hall at Derby on Monday night, Nov. 15th, which all persons interested are invited to attend. L. W. Walker, the tester of the association will make a report and the county agent will furnish a part of the program by giving a discussion on some phase of agriculture.

There will be an excursion for persons interested in Holstein cattle on Thursday and Friday of this week to Littleton, N. H. The excursion will start from Newport at 8.30 a. m., going via Charleston, Willoughby lake and St. Johnsbury and expecting to arrive in Littleton before noon. In the afternoon three herds of pure-bred Holstein stock will be visited and will return to St. Johnsbury that evening, and from there, Friday morning, it is expected two more Holstein herds will be visited and probably the Vail State School of Agriculture in Lyndonville, but returning home Friday afternoon.
