Mr. Asselin was taken to the hospital November 9 to undergo an operation for appendicitis but an examination disclosed that he was suffering from cancer of the abdomen which defied medical skill.

The St. Johnsbury Commercial club through its committee, is conducting several new lines of activities. The charities endorsement plan has been adopted by the merchants and an industrial survey is to be undertaken in order that the natural and artificial advantages of the town may be known and utilized. Other problems under consideration are the study of local history in the public schools; the advisability of improving the local charter; and the possibility of interesting some industry that will employ female labor.

Fire that is thought to have originated in a defective chimney destroyed the home of Gardner Kenerson a few miles from St. Johnsbury last week. The house, two large barns, and a silo filled with ensilage on Andrew McKee's farm about three miles north of St. Johnsbury, were destroyed by fire Tuesday, Nov. 9. The fire started near the chimney in the kitchen and was beyond control before help arrived. The furniture and all of the livestock and farm tools were saved, but an immense stock of hay and grain was lost. The loss is estimated at \$7,000, with insurance of 4500.
